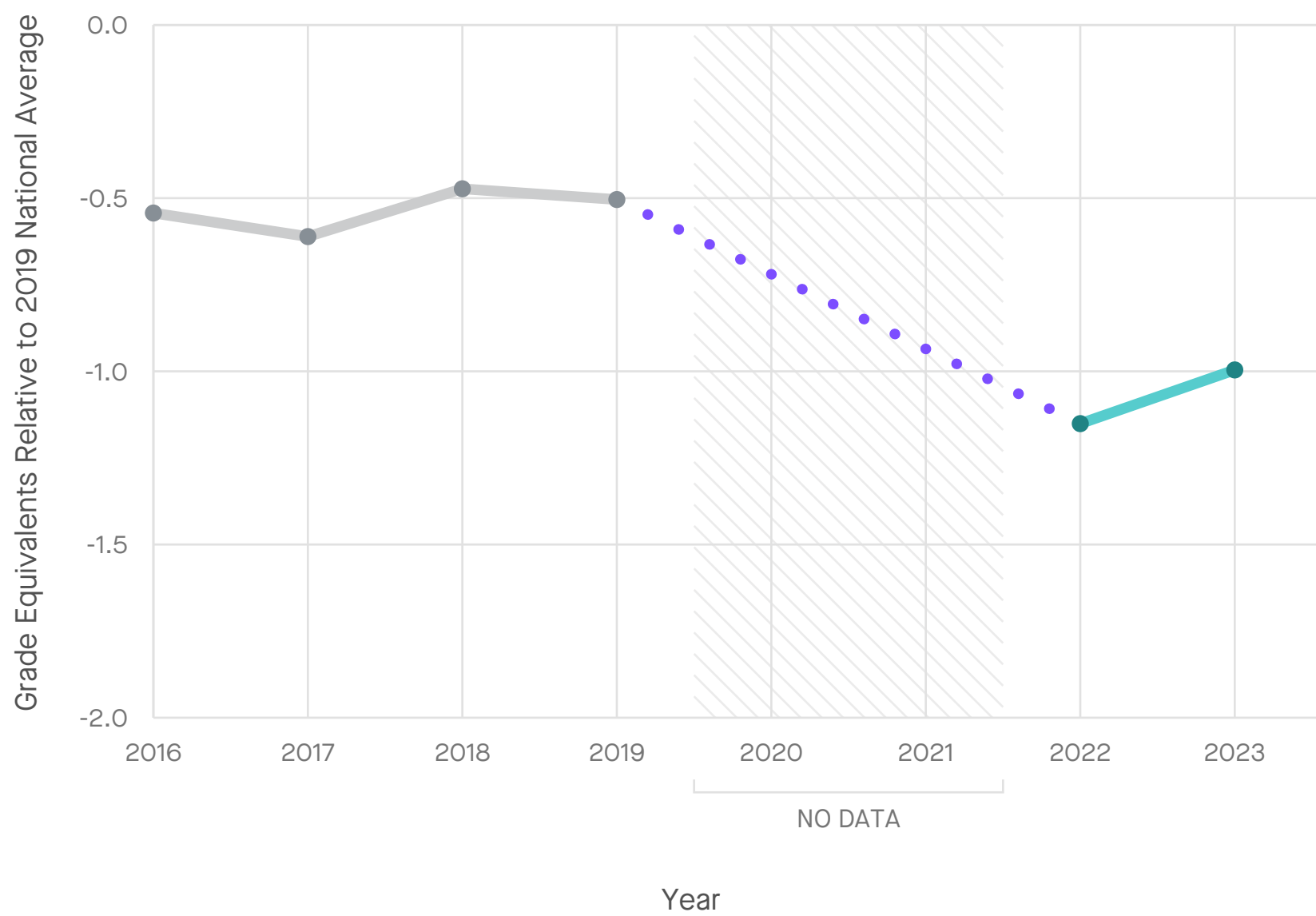

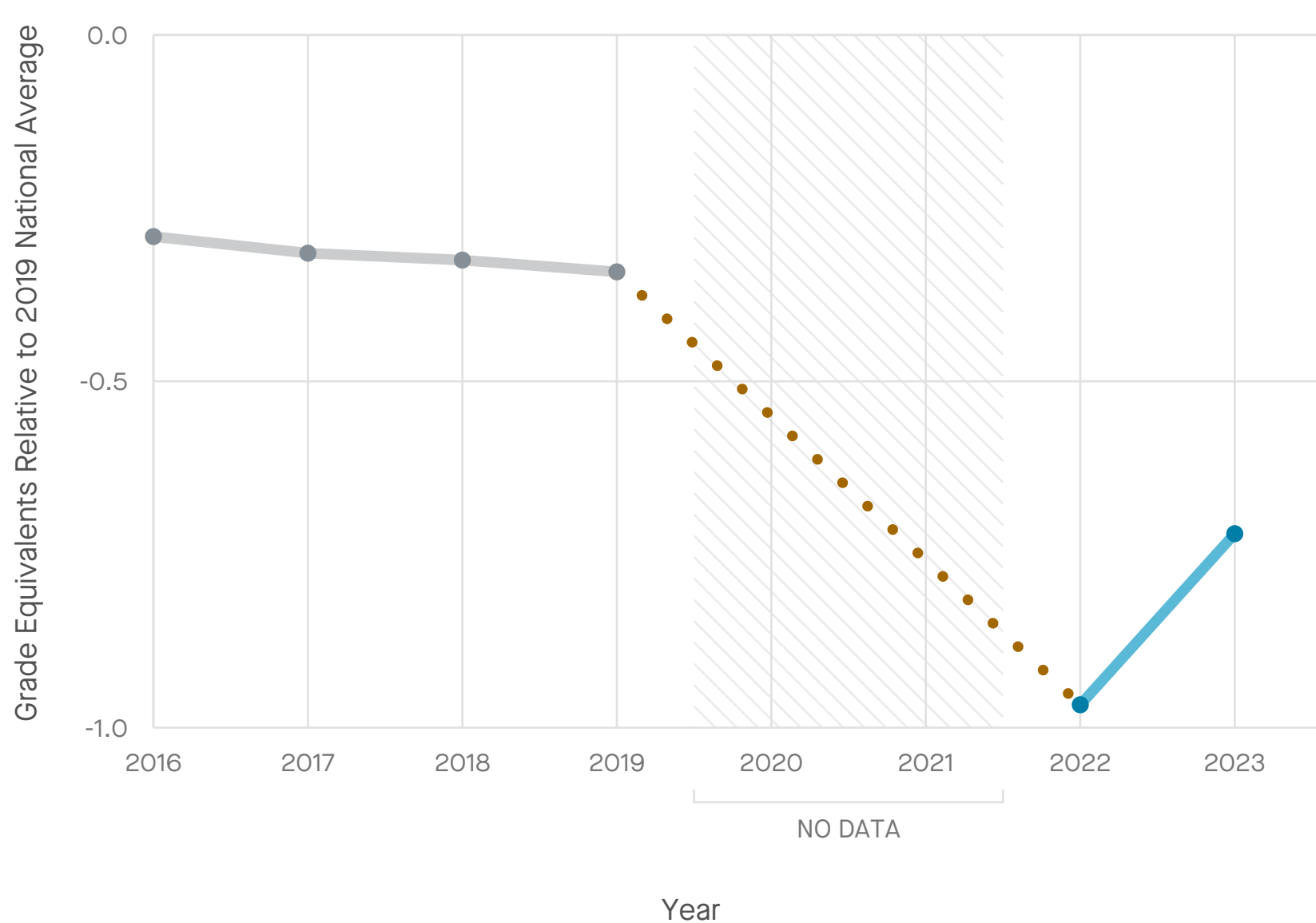

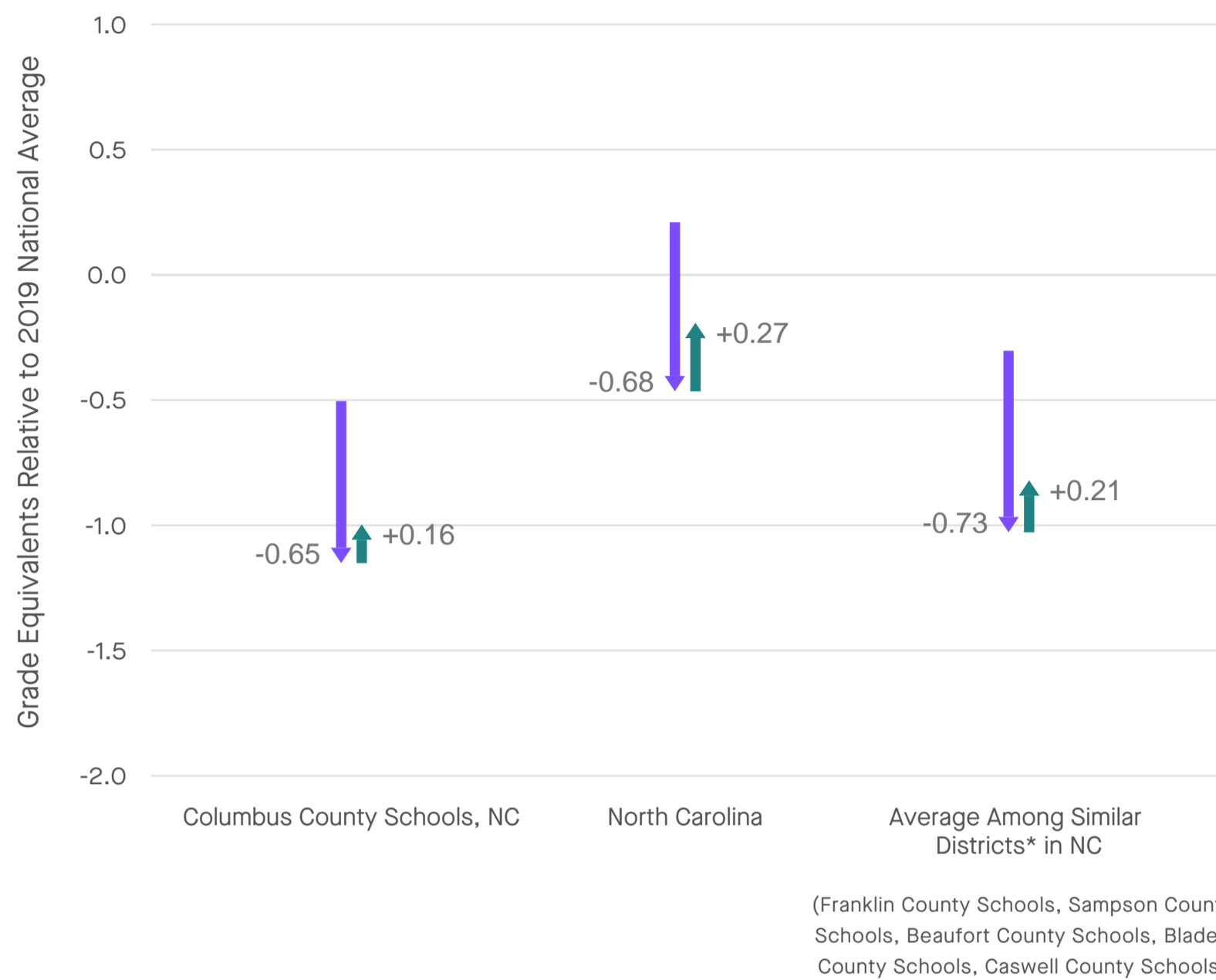

Math Performance in Columbus County Schools vs. North Carolina and Similar Districts, Grades 3-8, 2019-2023



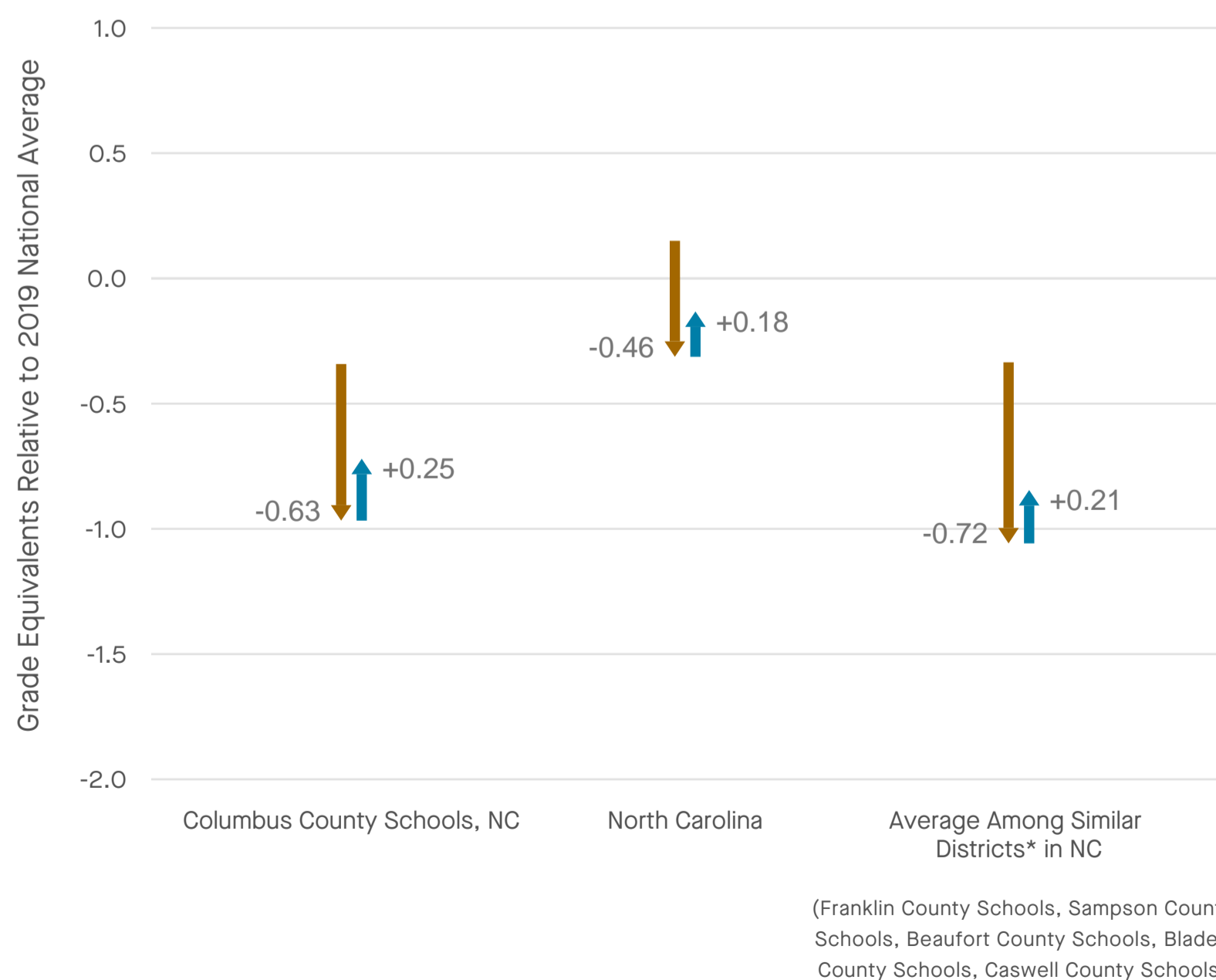

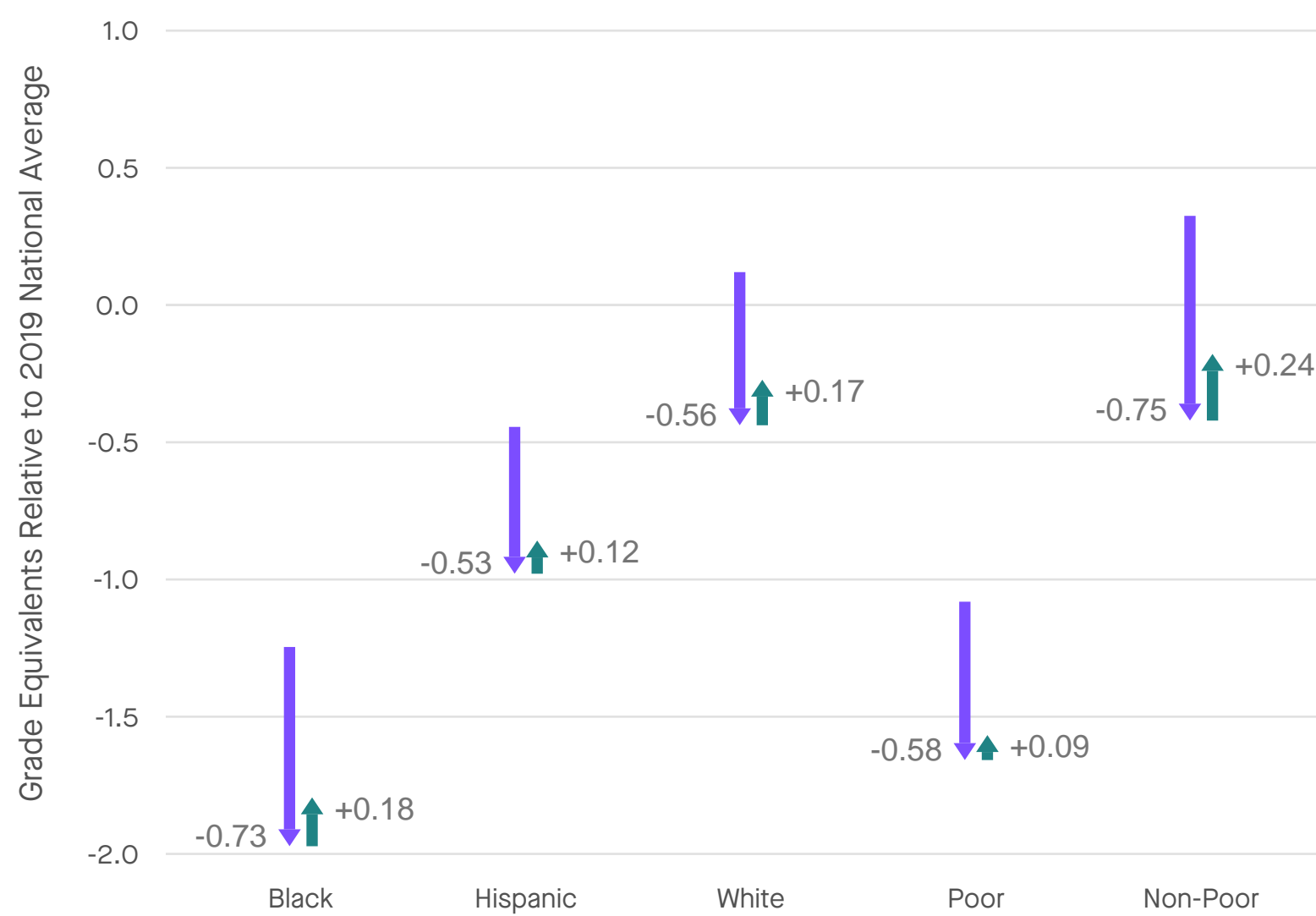

Math Performance by Subgroup, Grades 3-8, 2019-2023

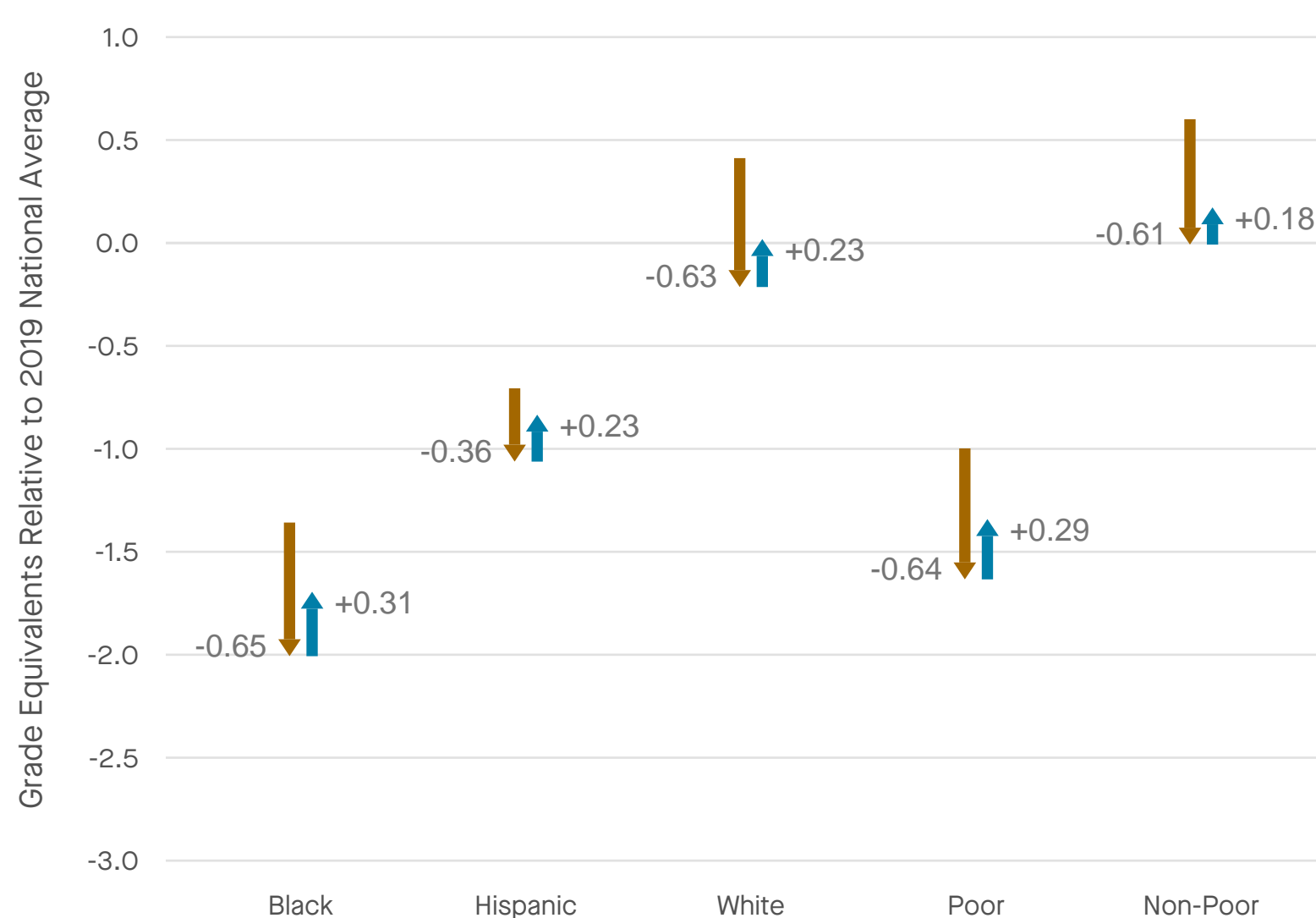

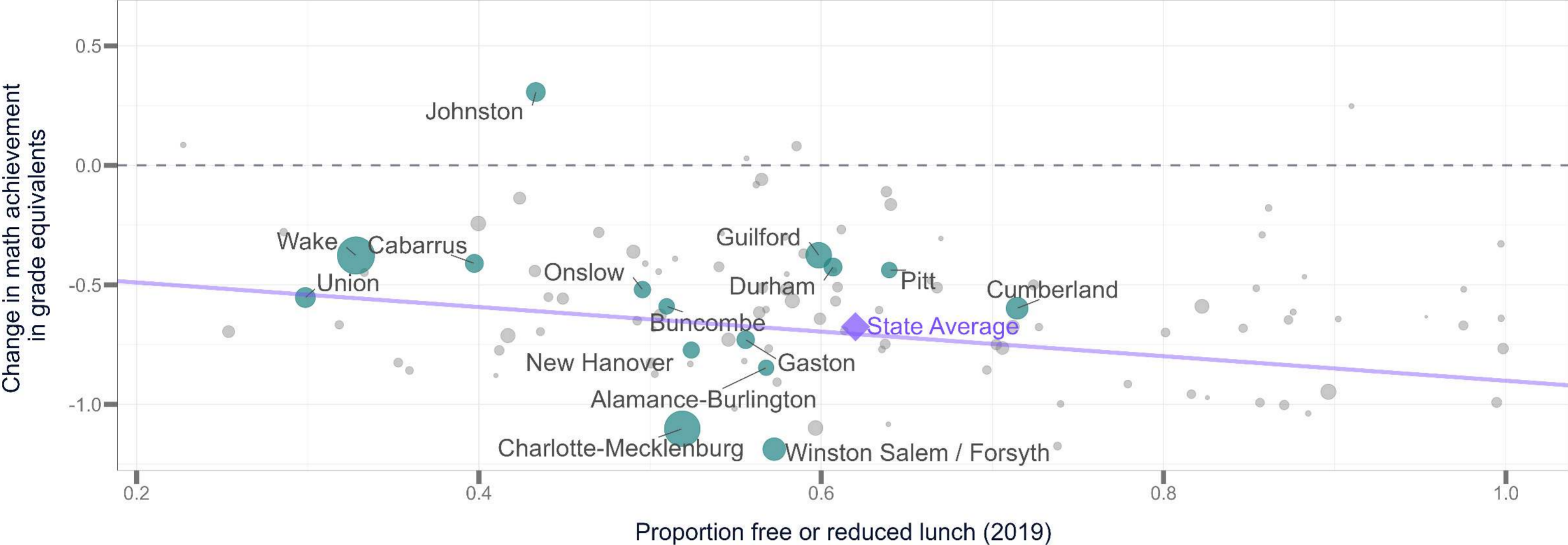

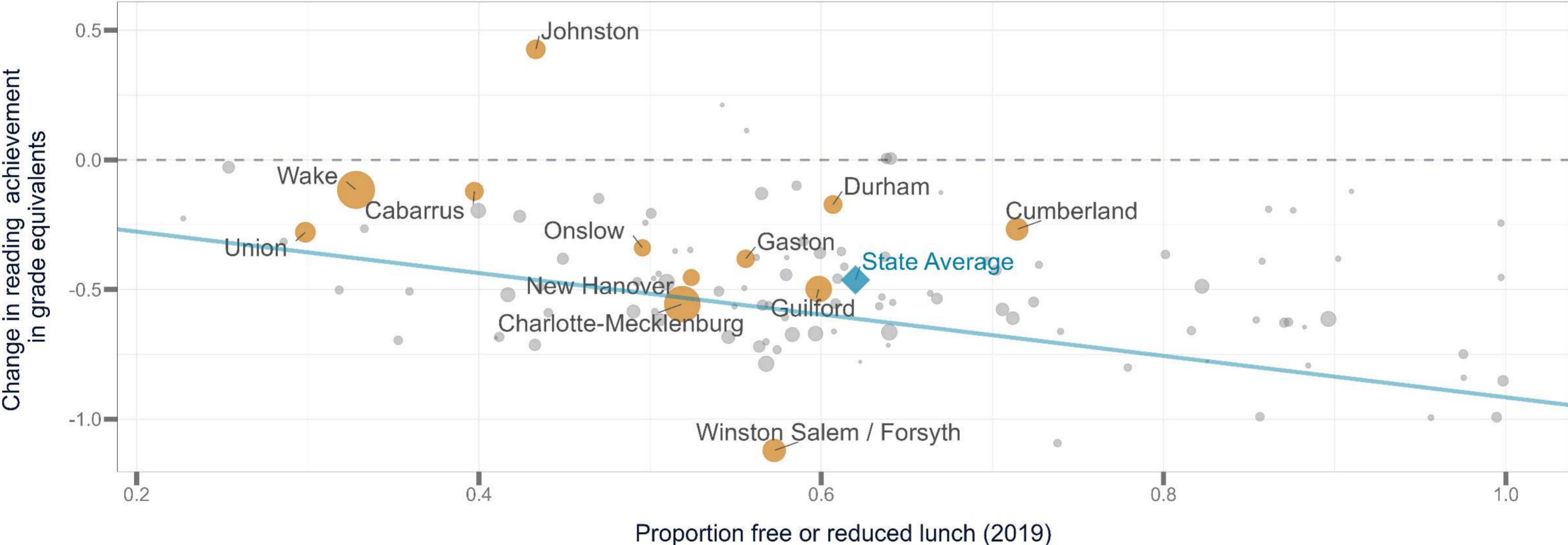

Change in Math Achievement 2019-2022 by proportion FRPL in North Carolina districts



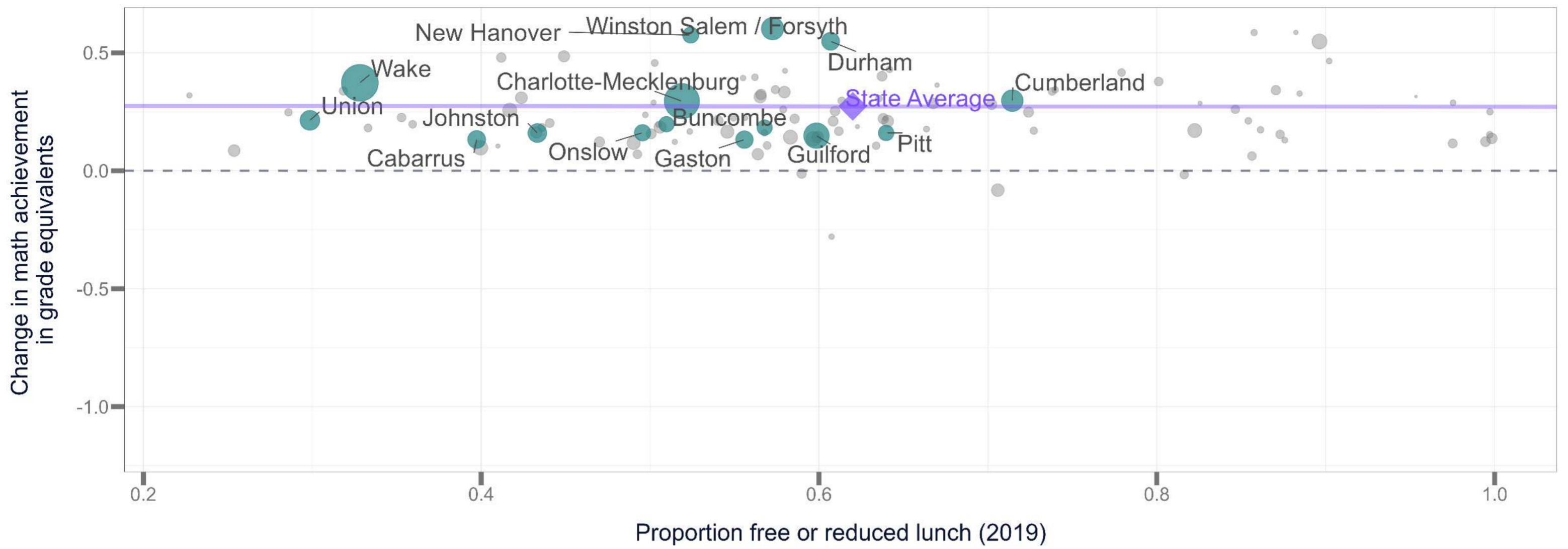

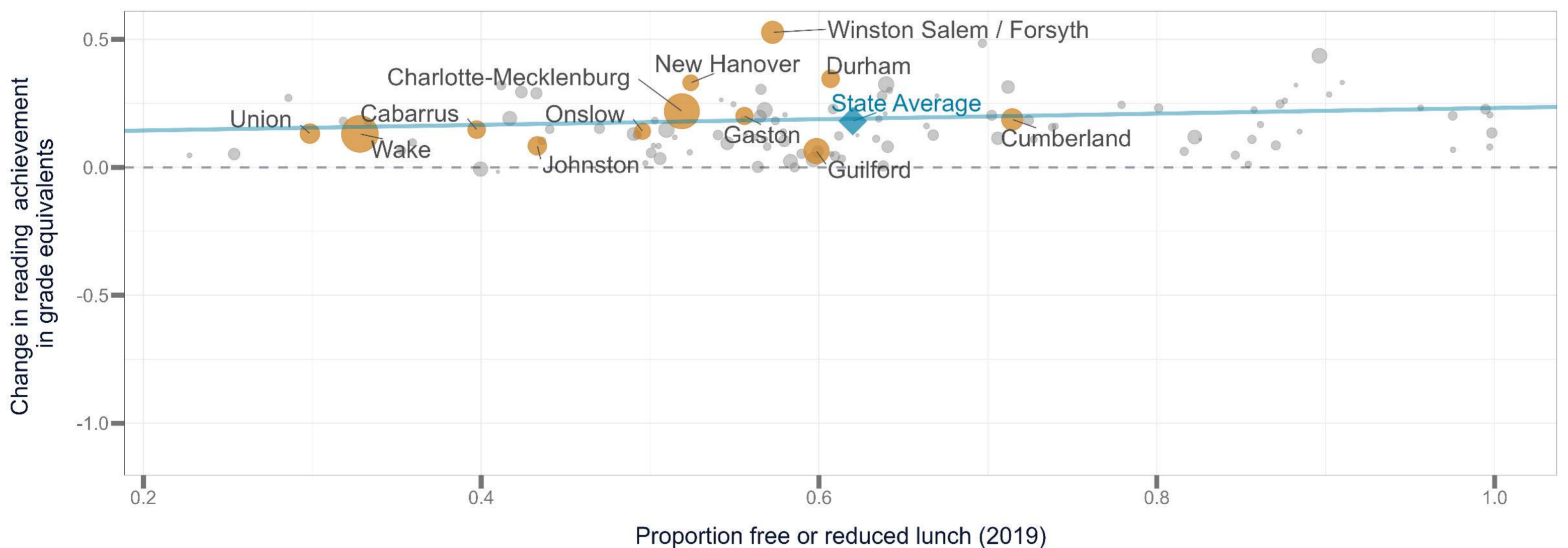

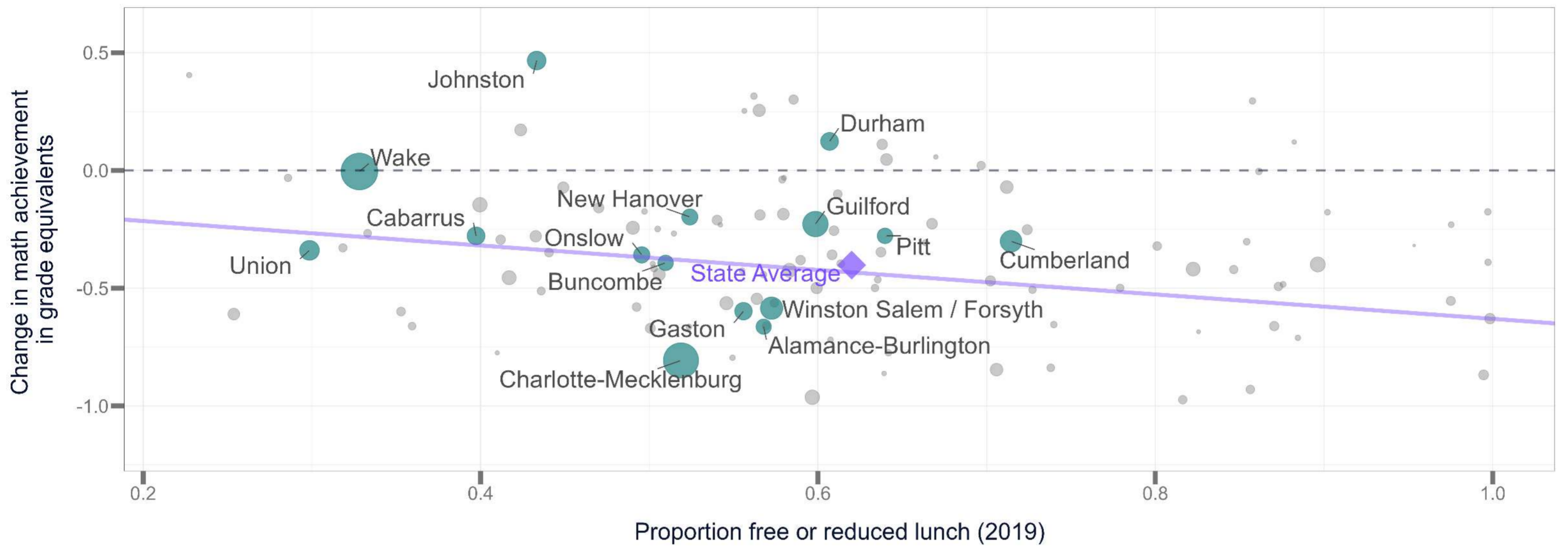

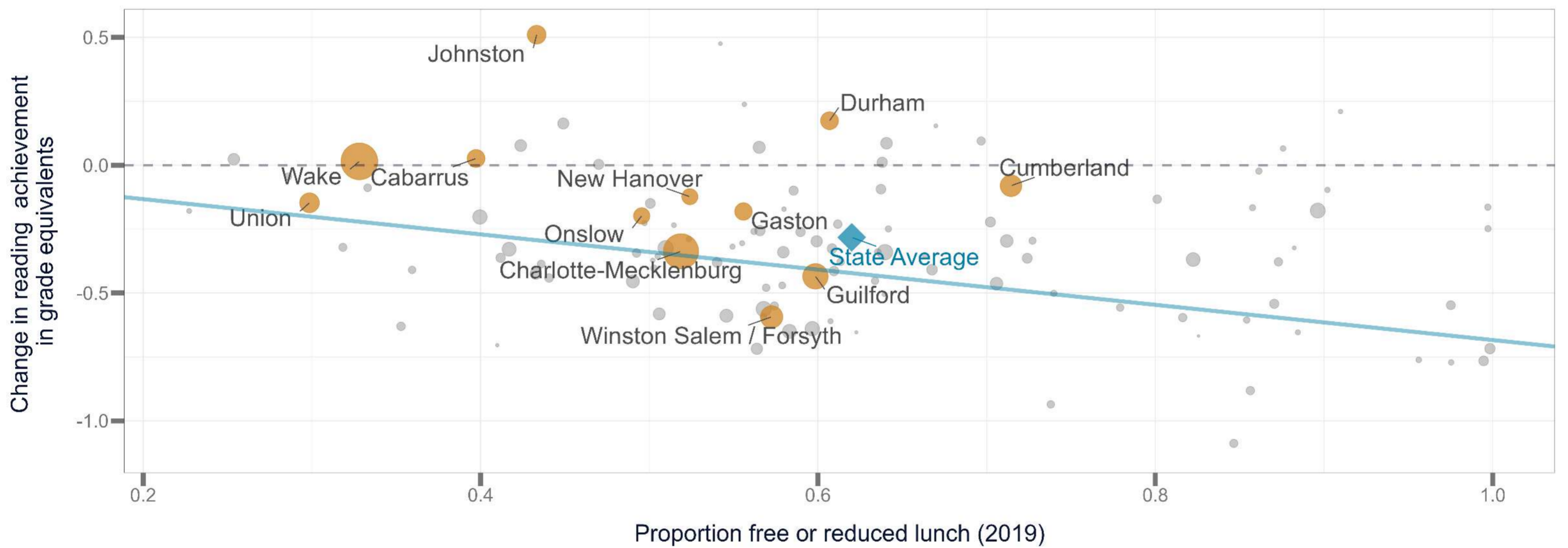

Change in Math Achievement 2019-2023 by proportion FRPL in North Carolina districts



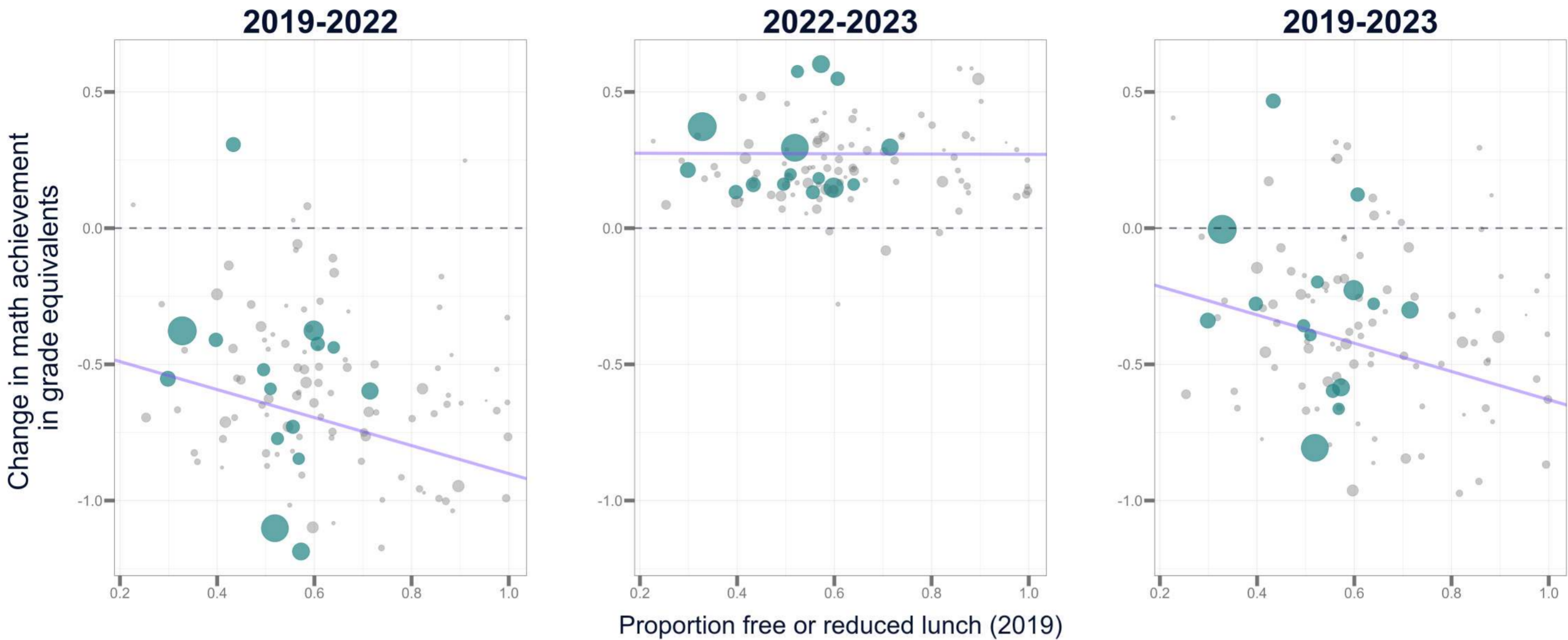

Change in Reading Achievement 2019-2023 by proportion FRPL in North Carolina districts



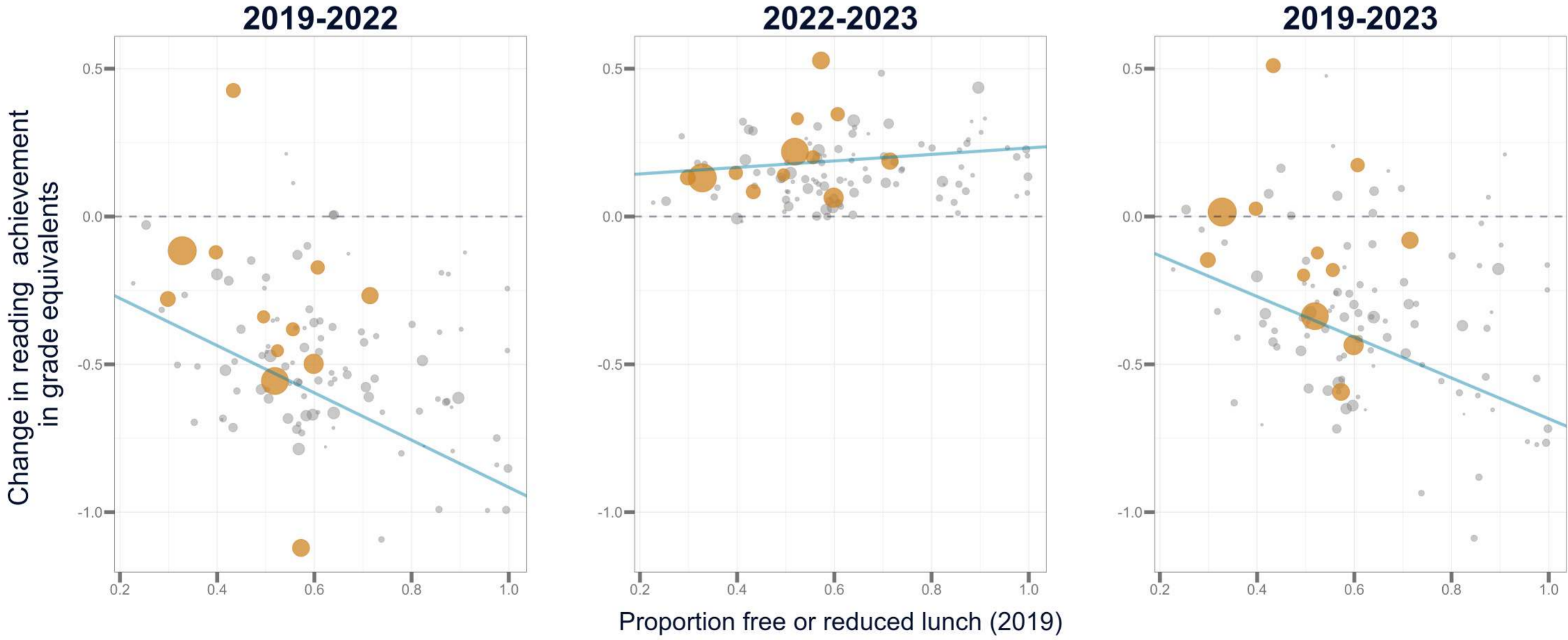

Change in Math Achievement by proportion FRPL in North Carolina districts



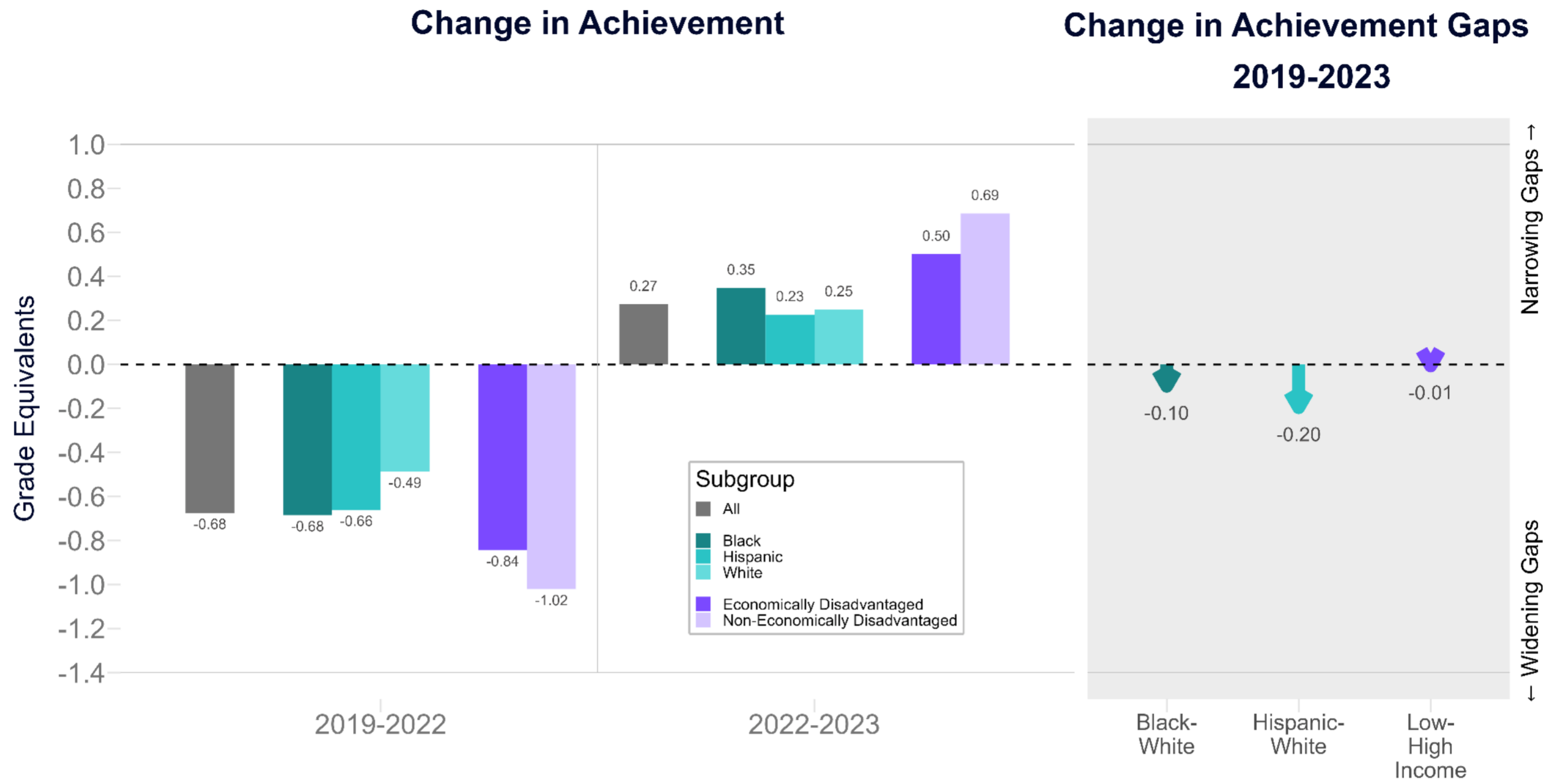

Change in Reading Achievement by proportion FRPL in North Carolina districts



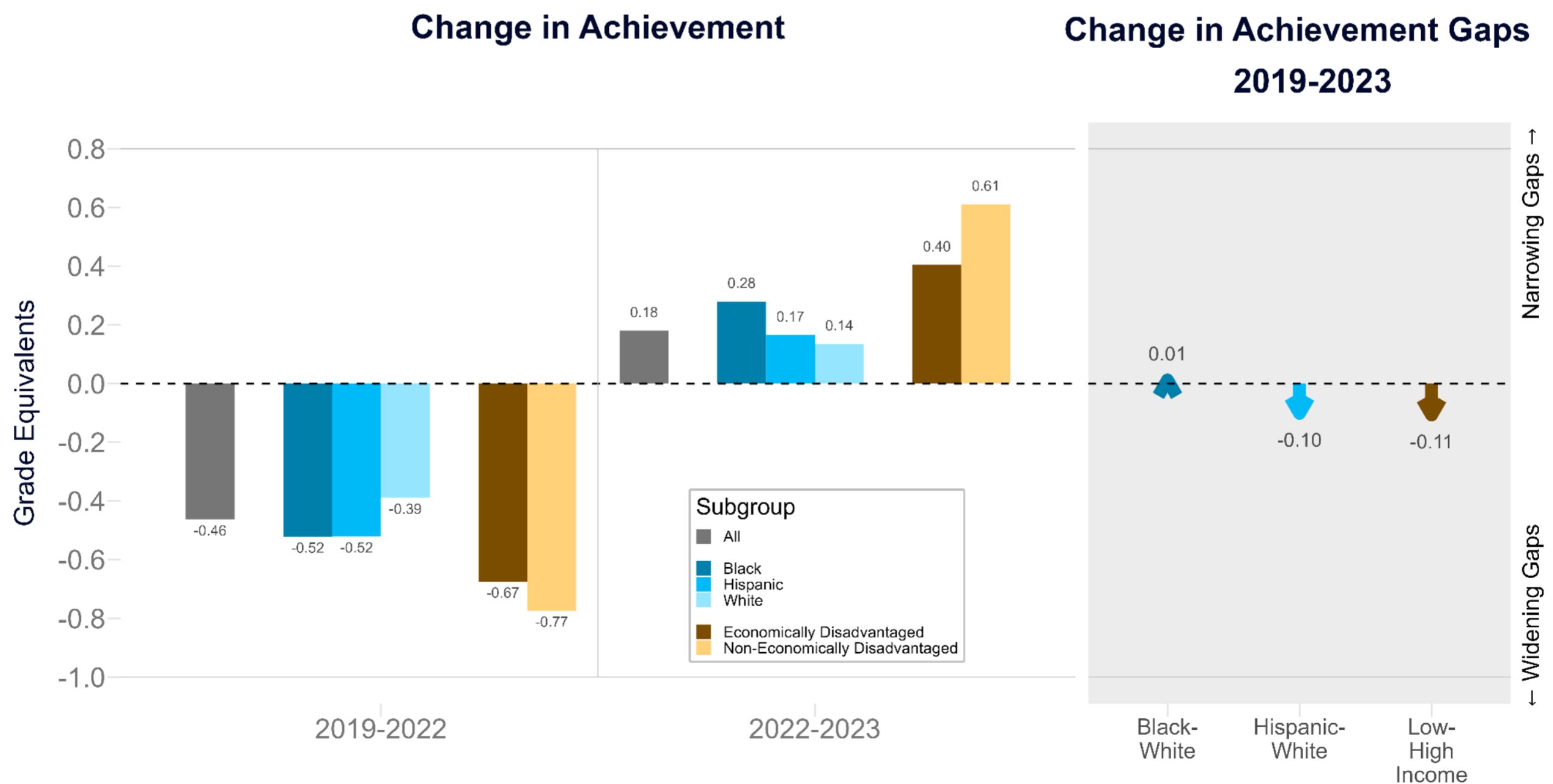
