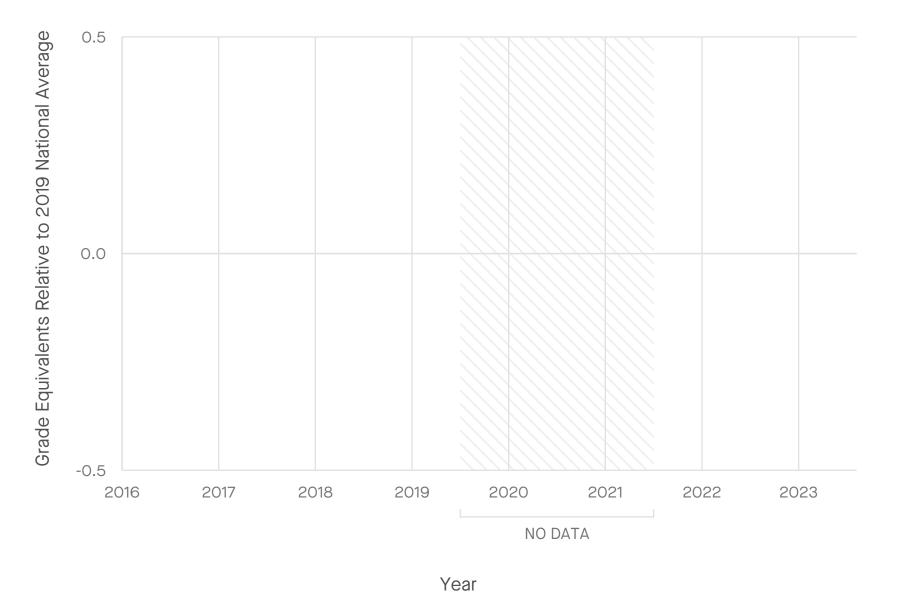

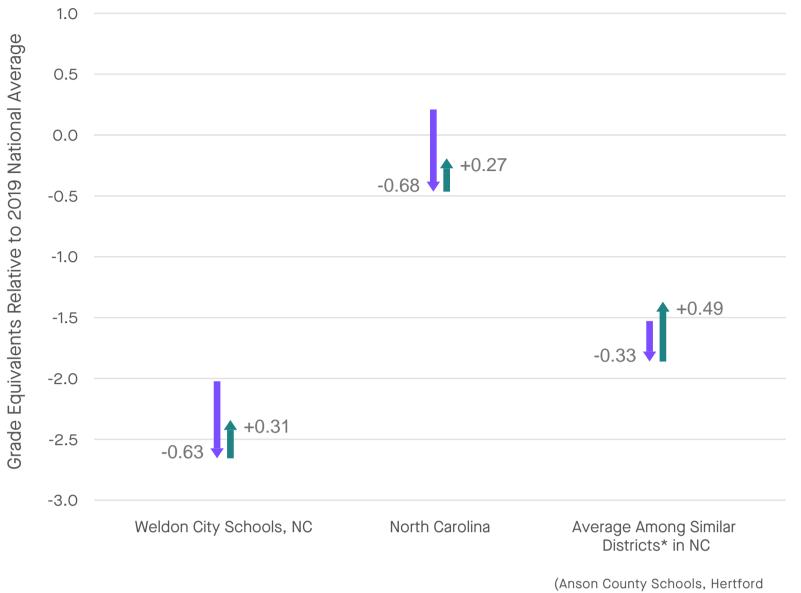

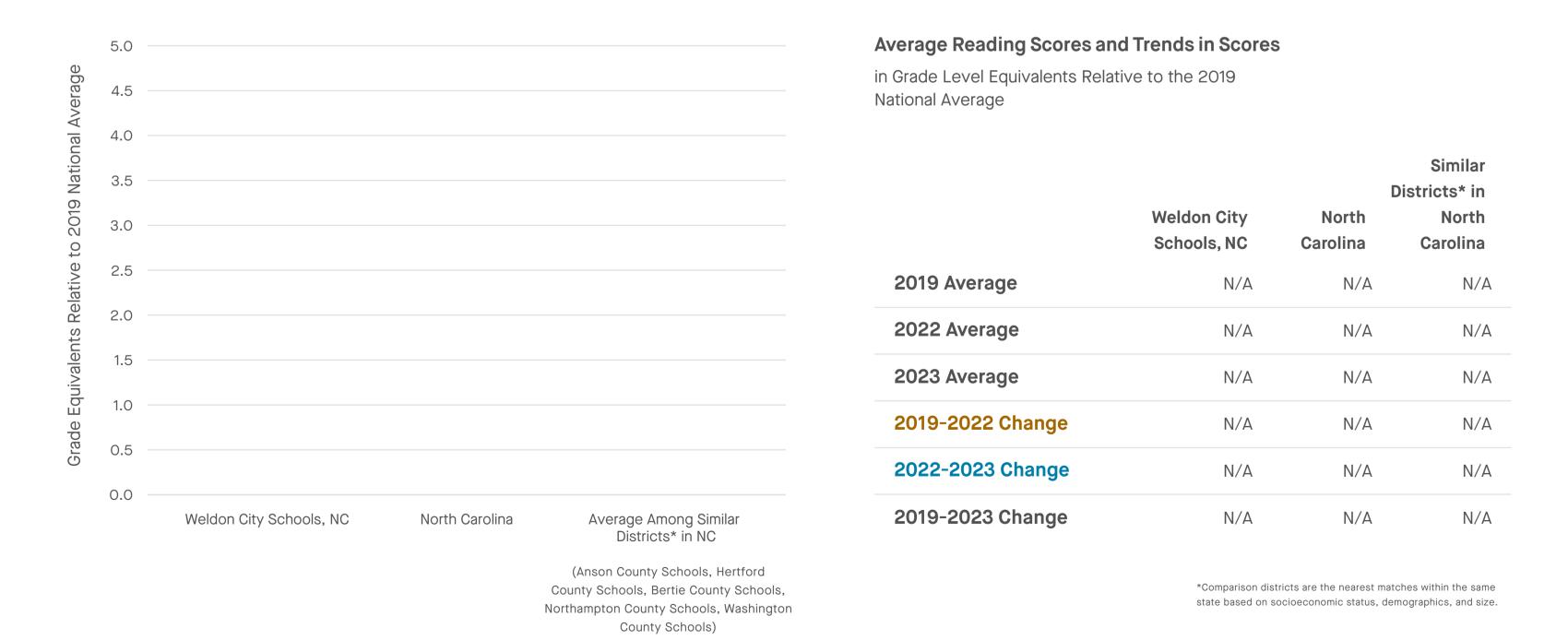

Reading Performance in Weldon City Schools vs. North Carolina and Similar Districts, Grades 3–8, 2019–2023



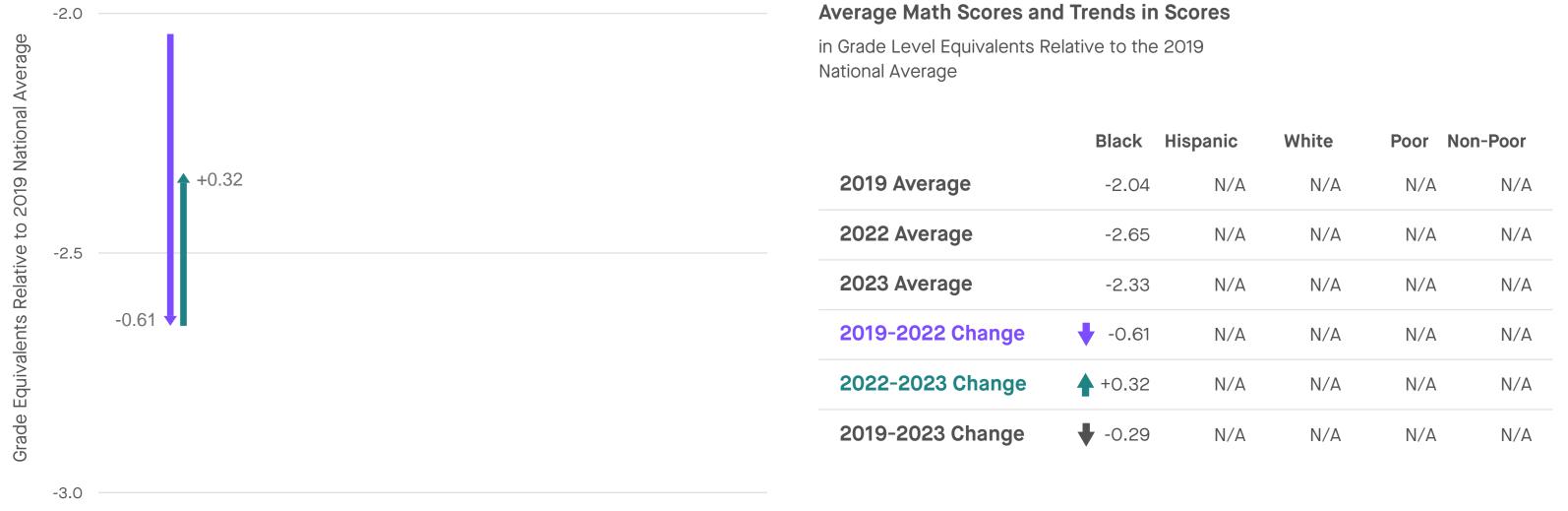

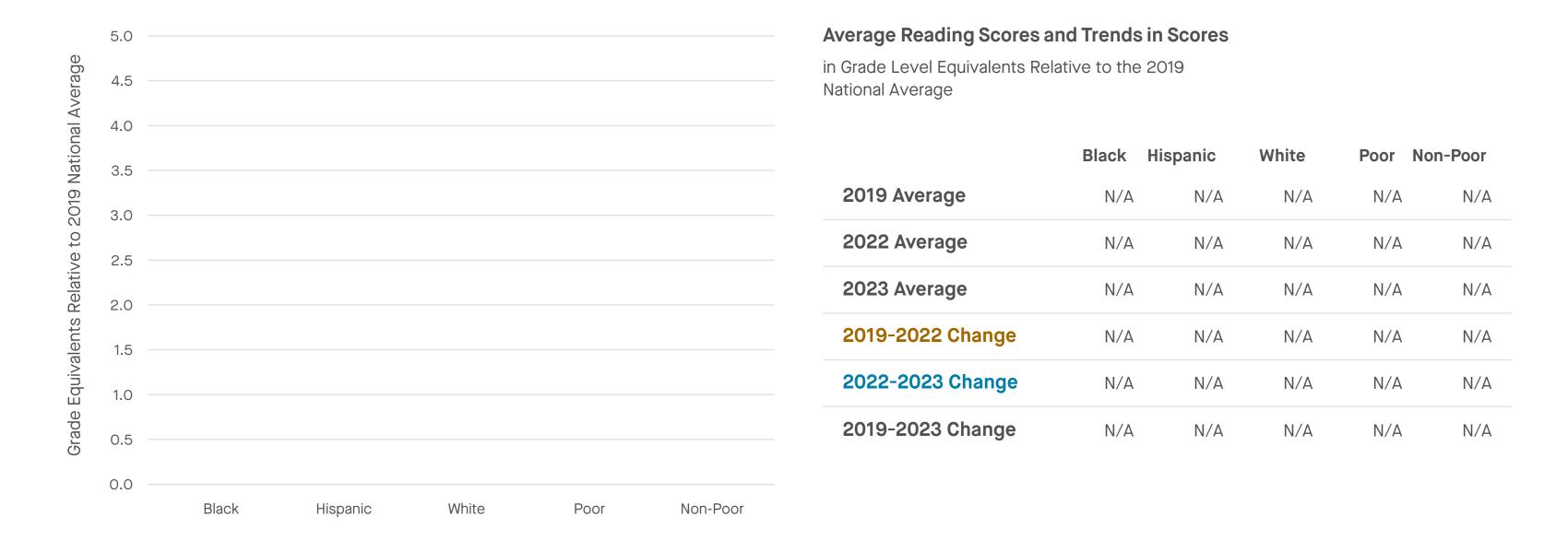
Math Performance by Subgroup, Grades 3–8, 2019–2023

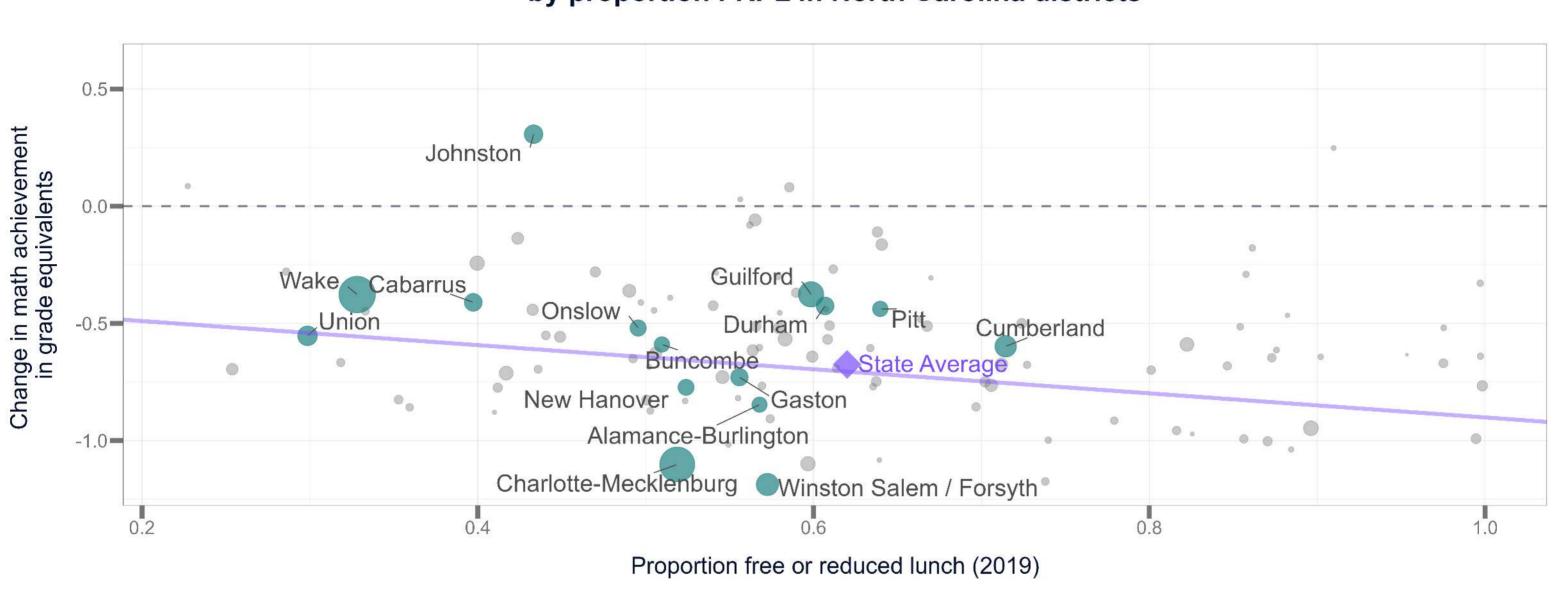
Reading Performance by Subgroup, Grades 3-8, 2019-2023

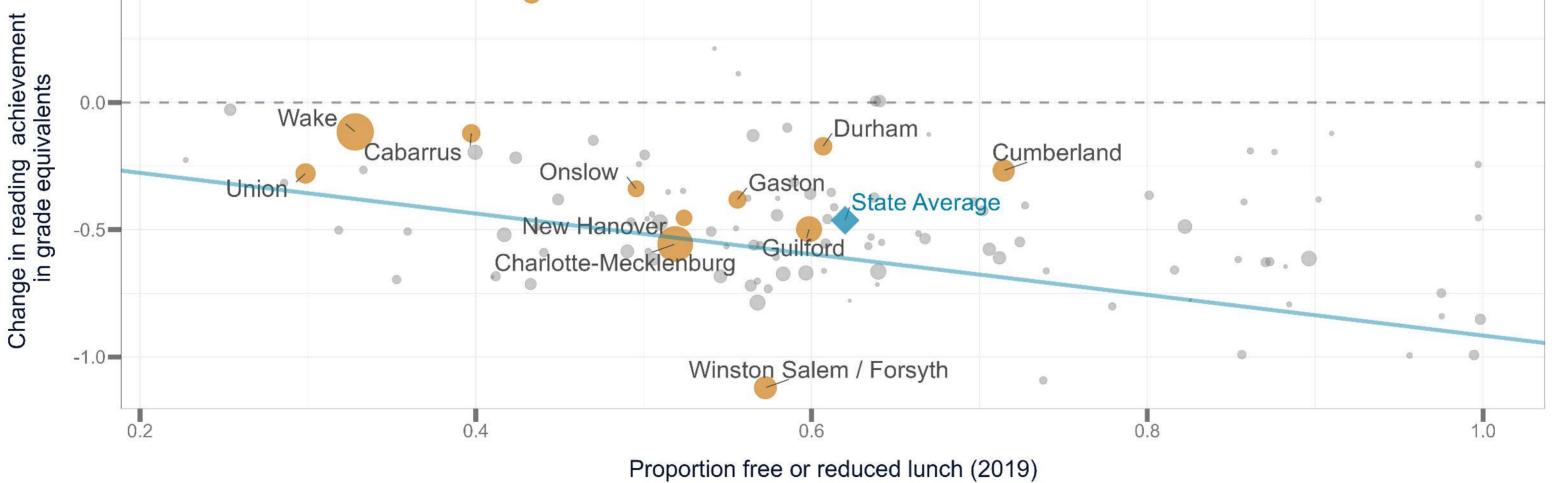

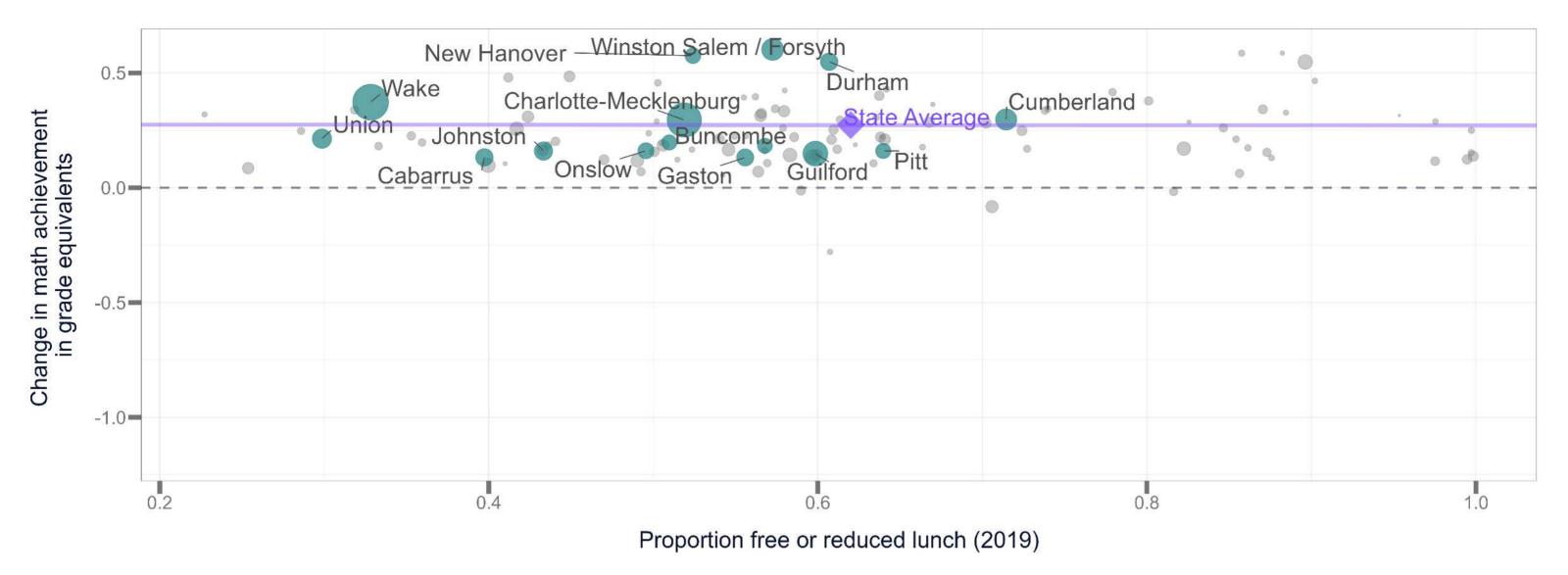

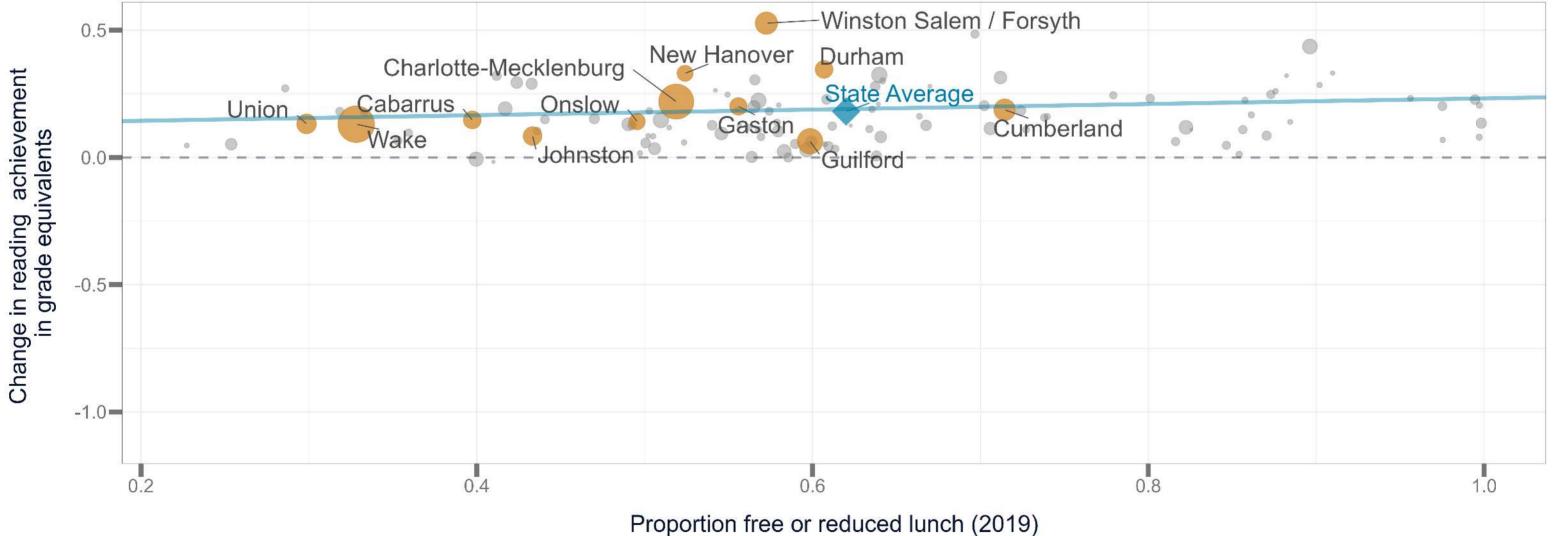
Change in Math Achievement 2022-2023 by proportion FRPL in North Carolina districts

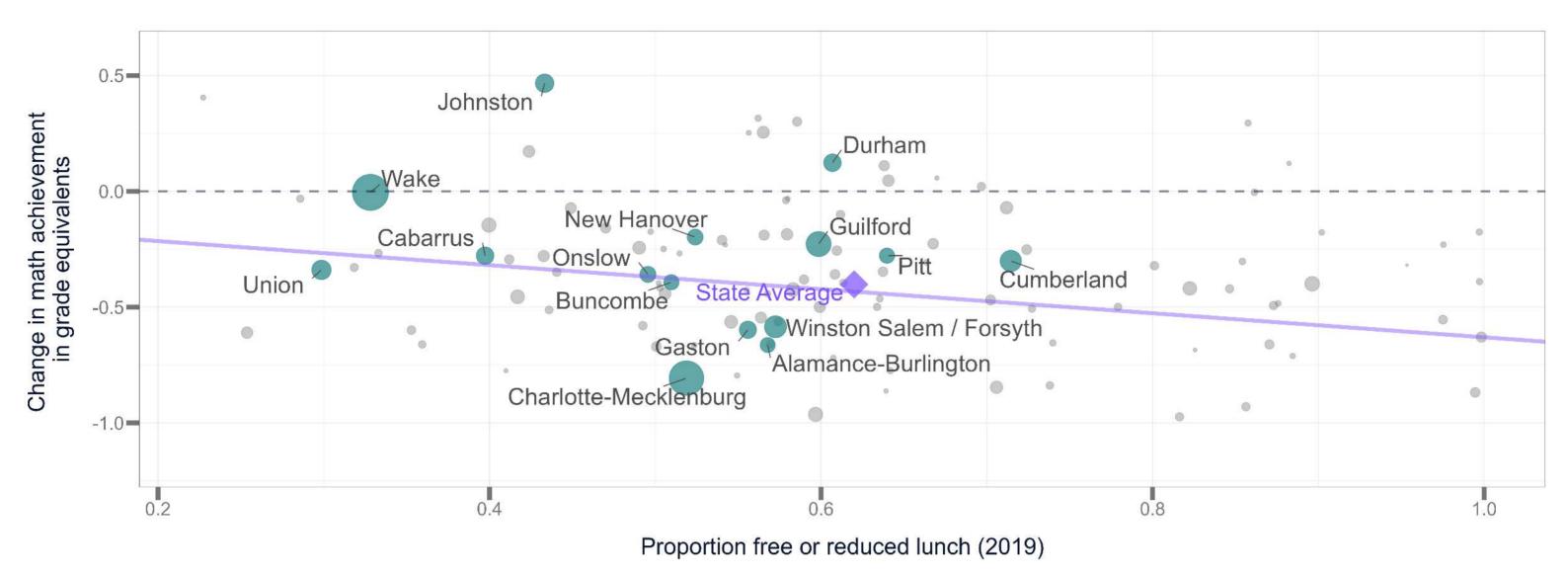

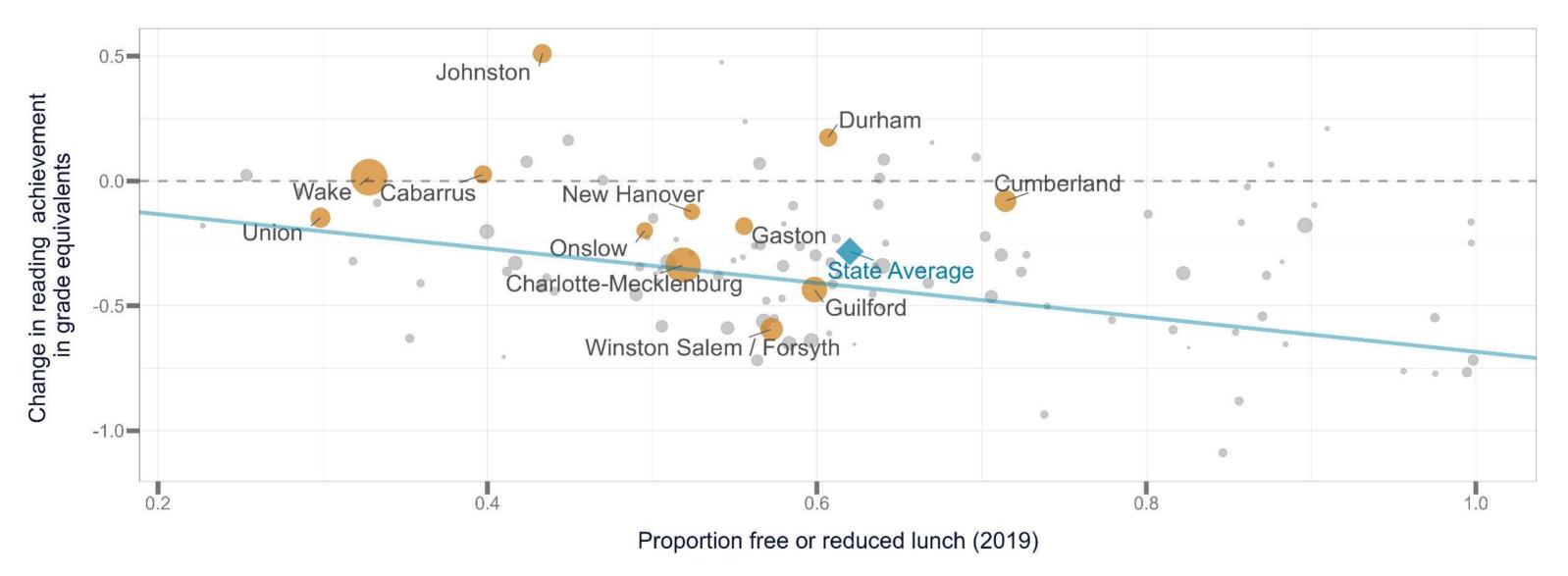

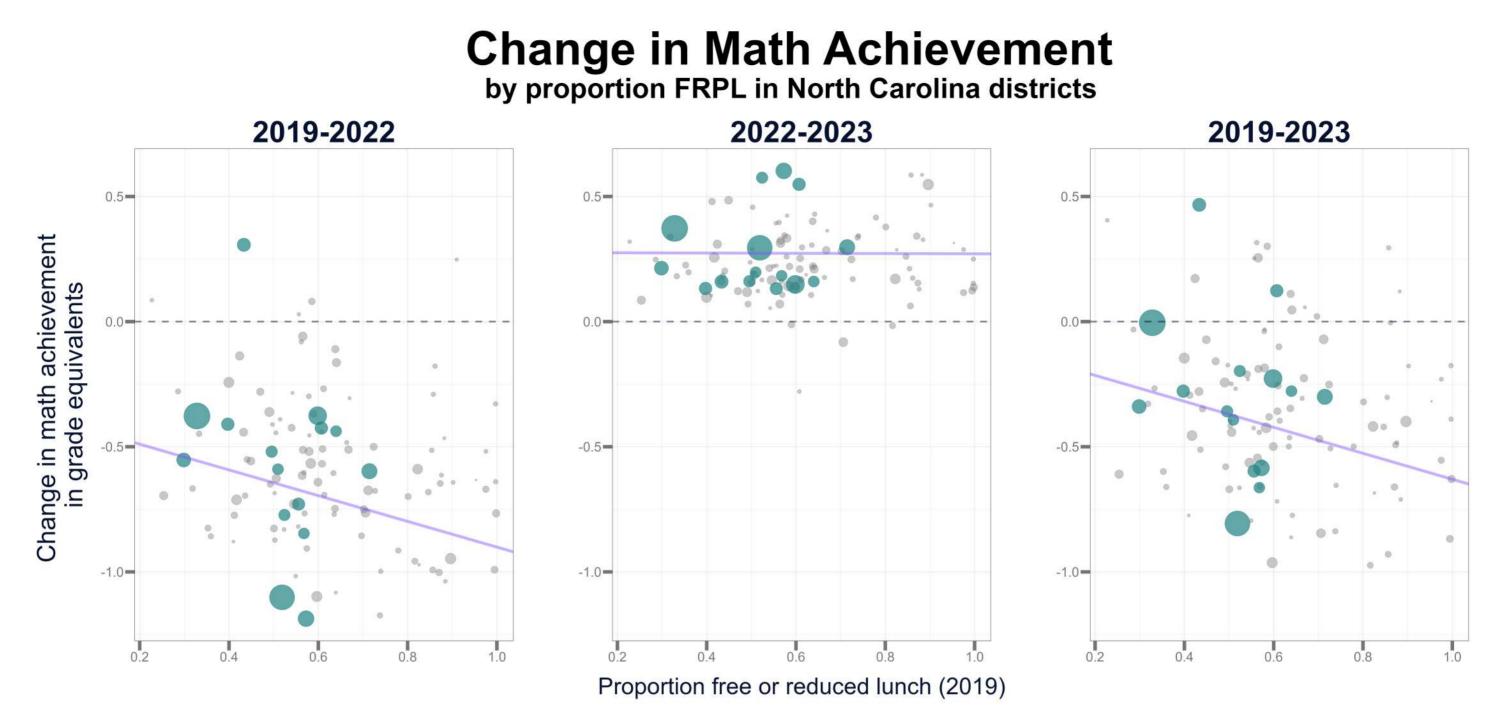

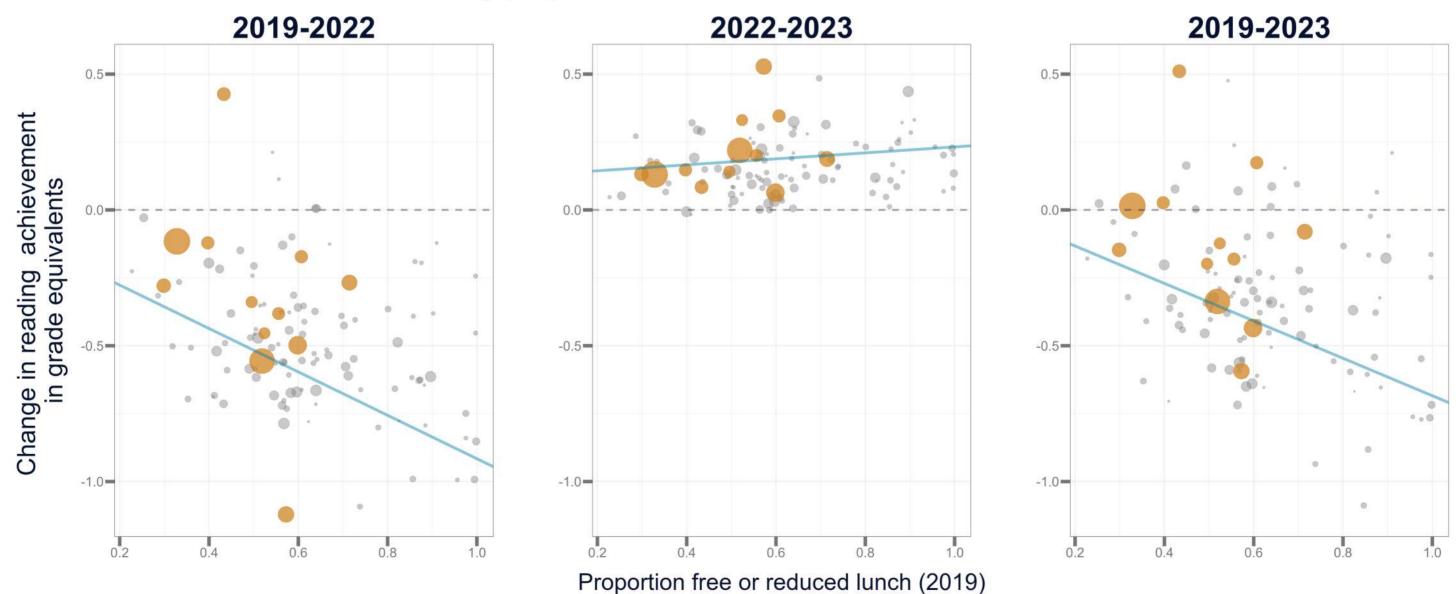

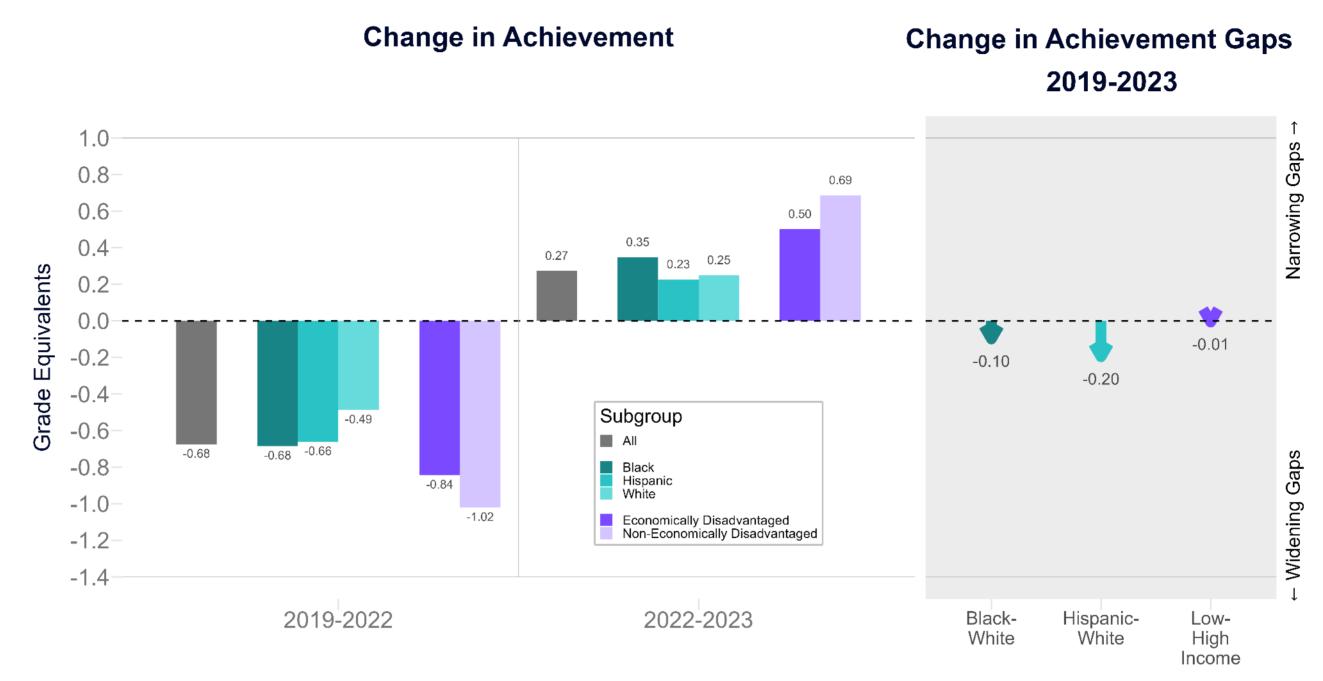
Change in Reading Achievement by proportion FRPL in North Carolina districts

North Carolina Math Achievement By Race and Economic Status



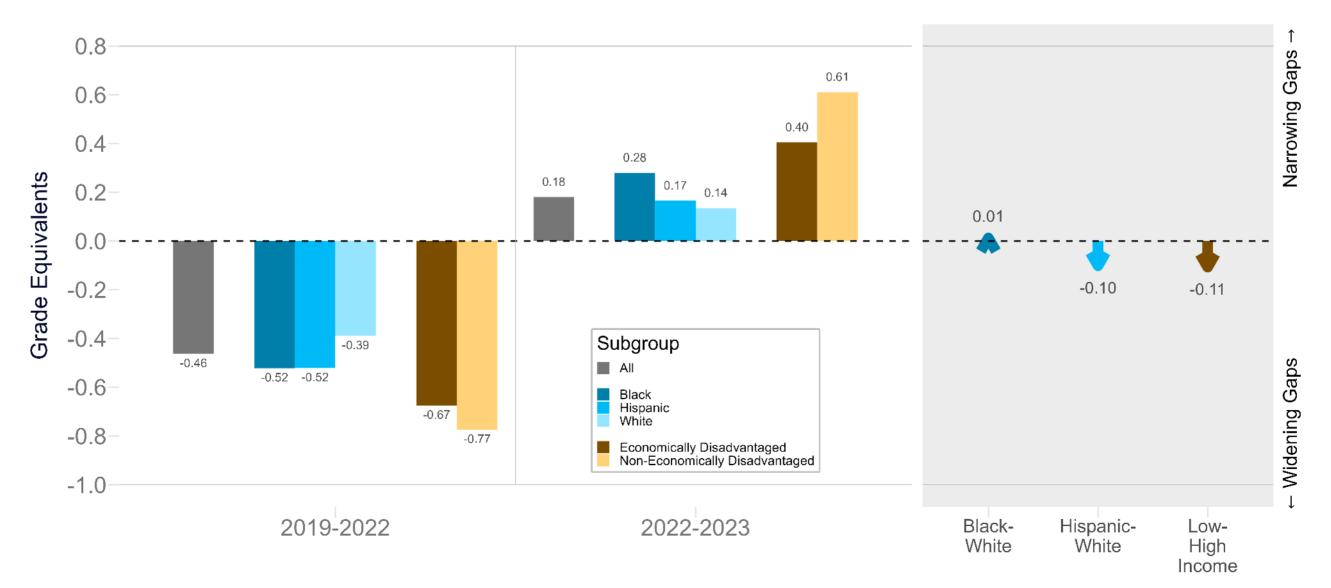
