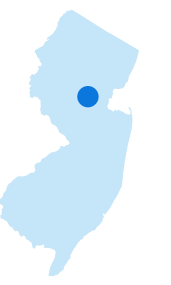
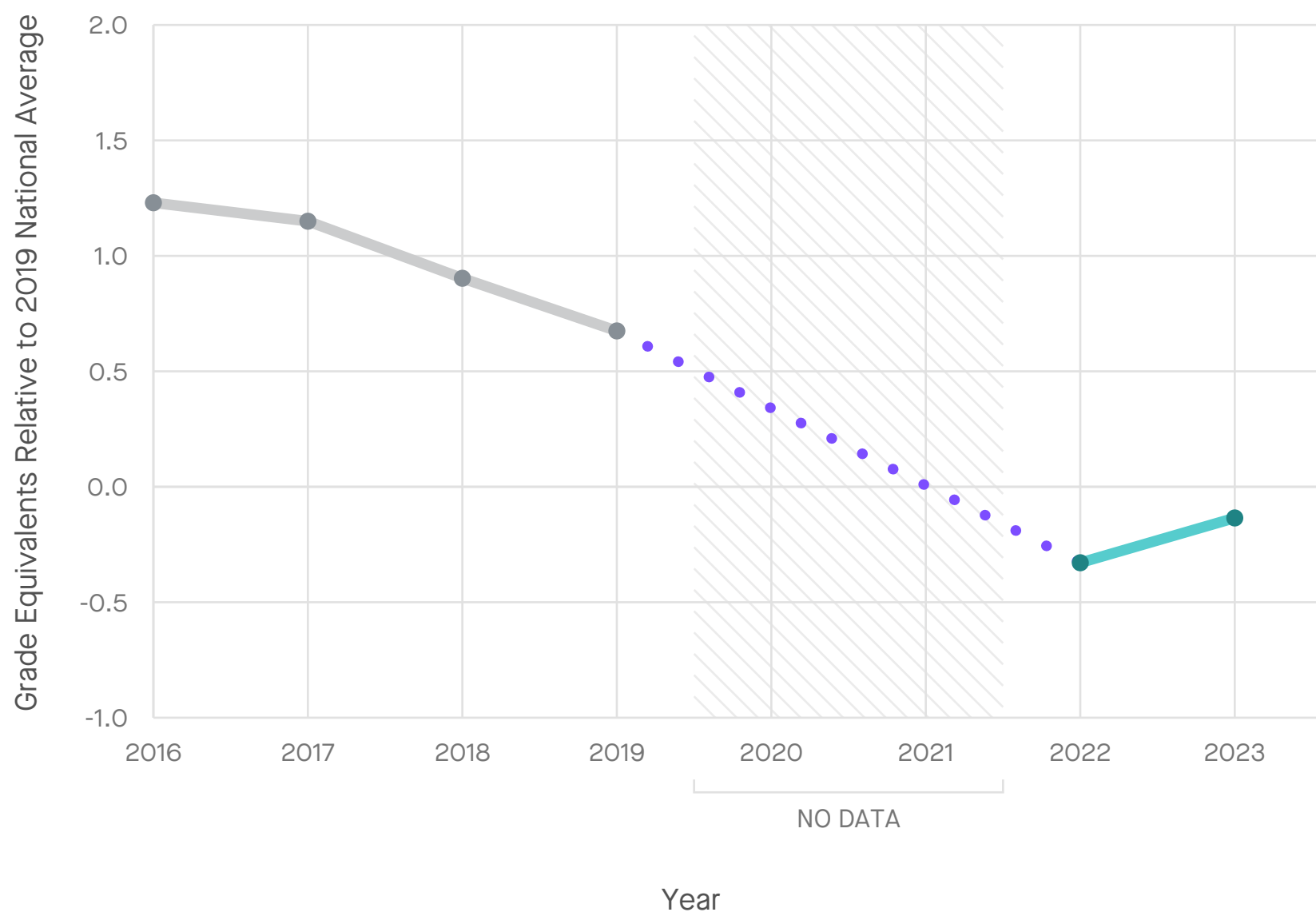

Math Performance, Grades 3-8, 2016-2023

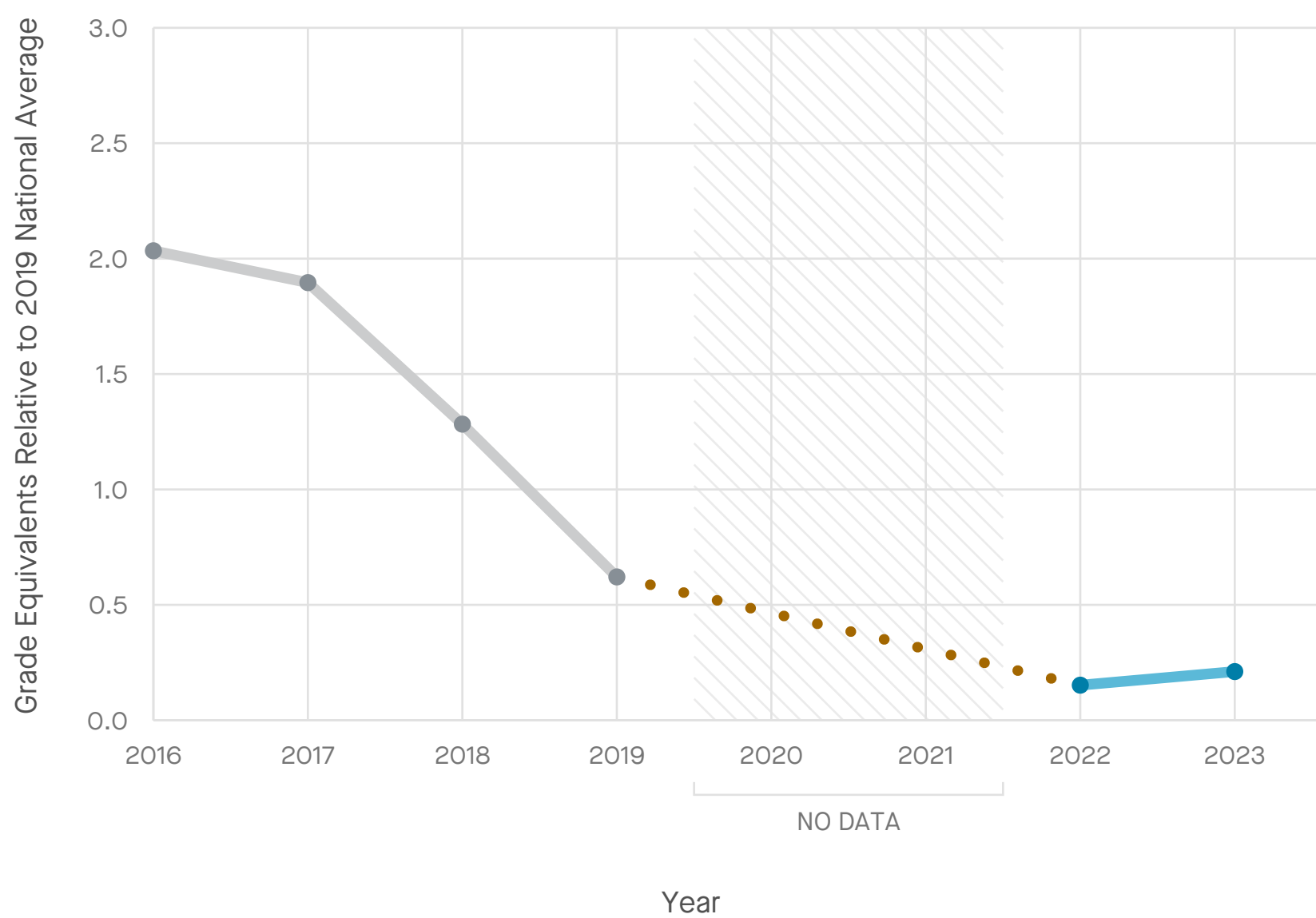

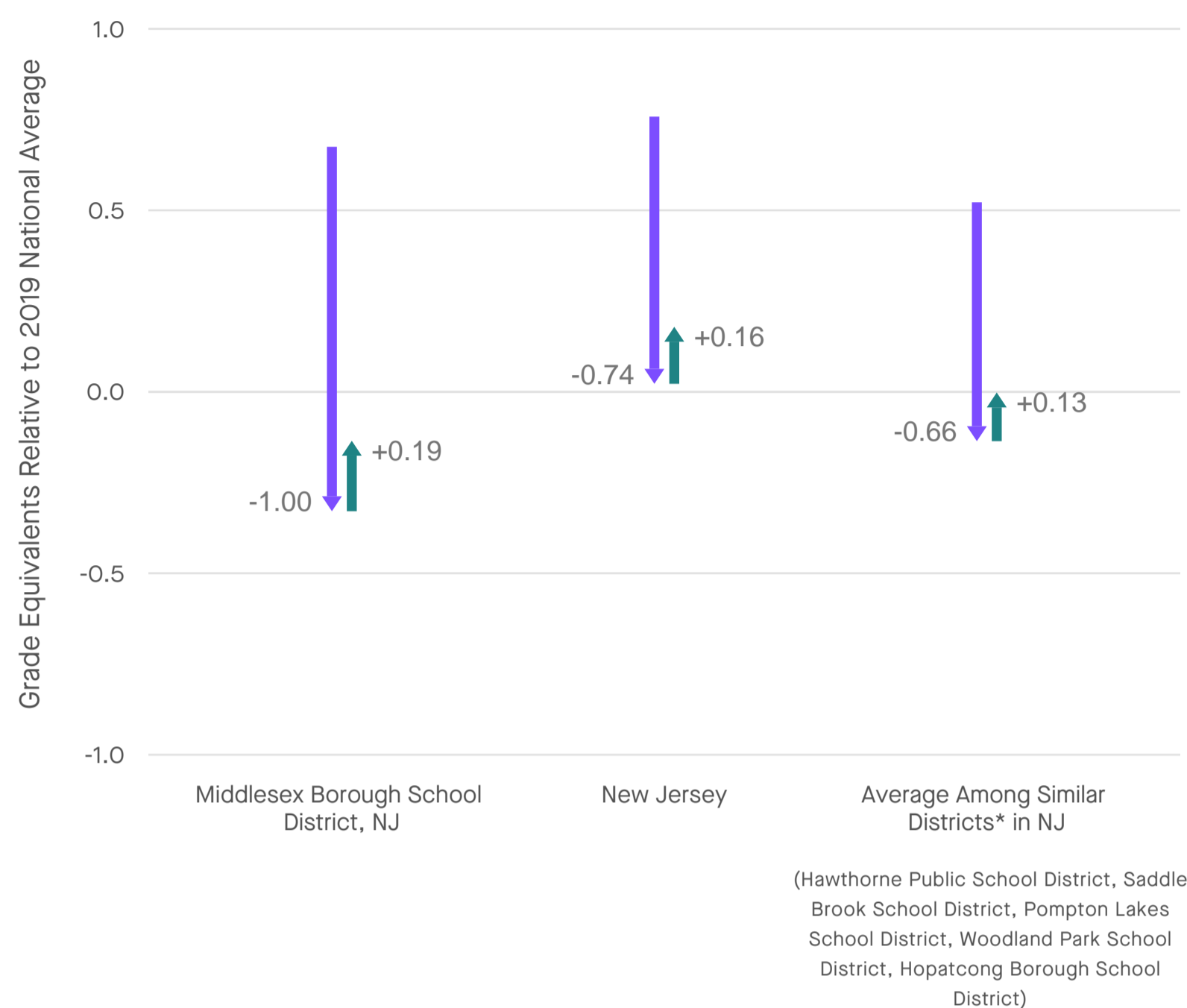

Math Performance in Middlesex Borough School District vs. New Jersey and Similar Districts, Grades 3-8, 2019-2023



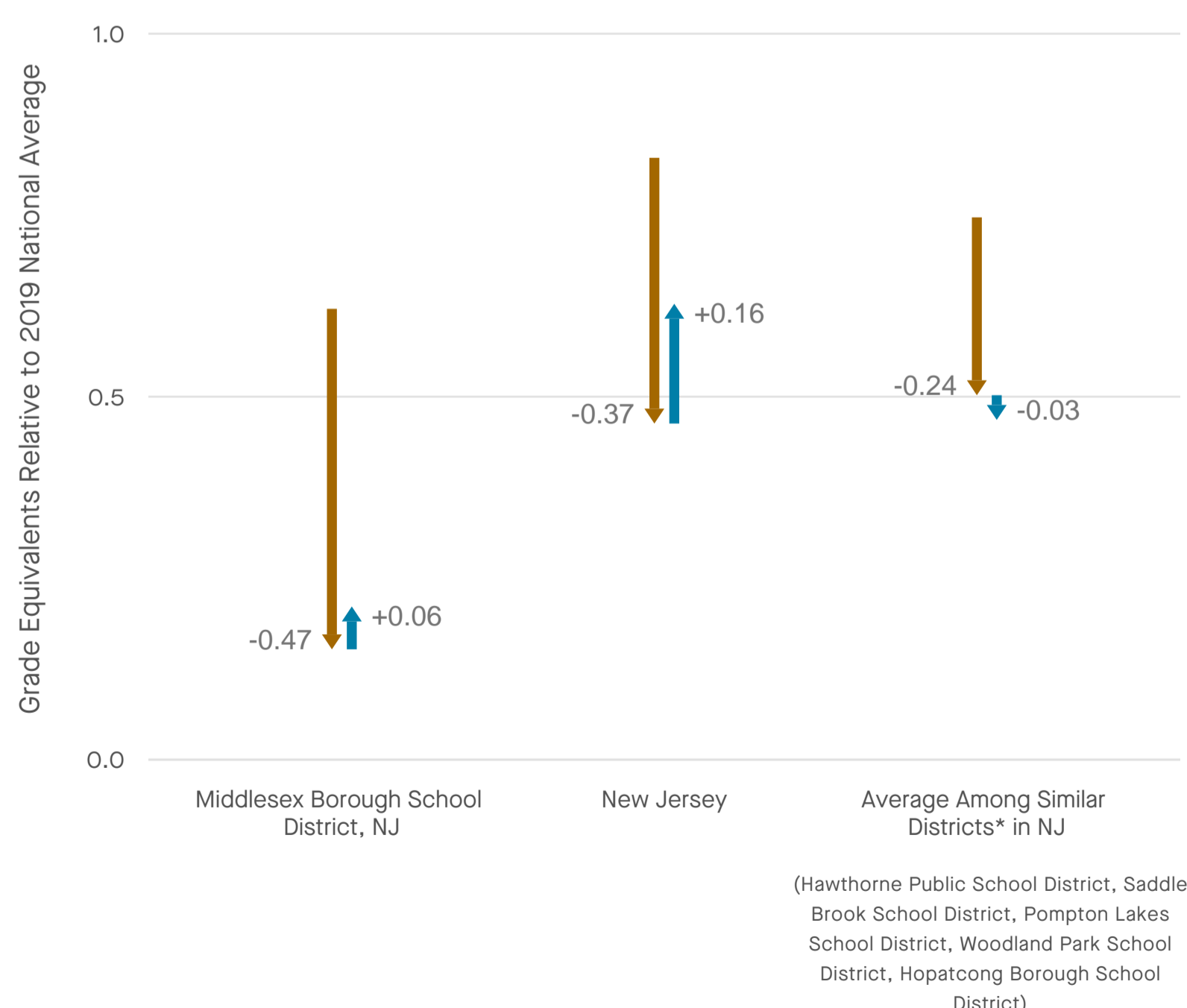

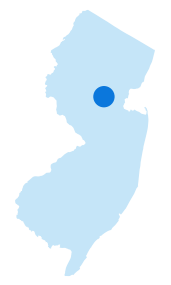

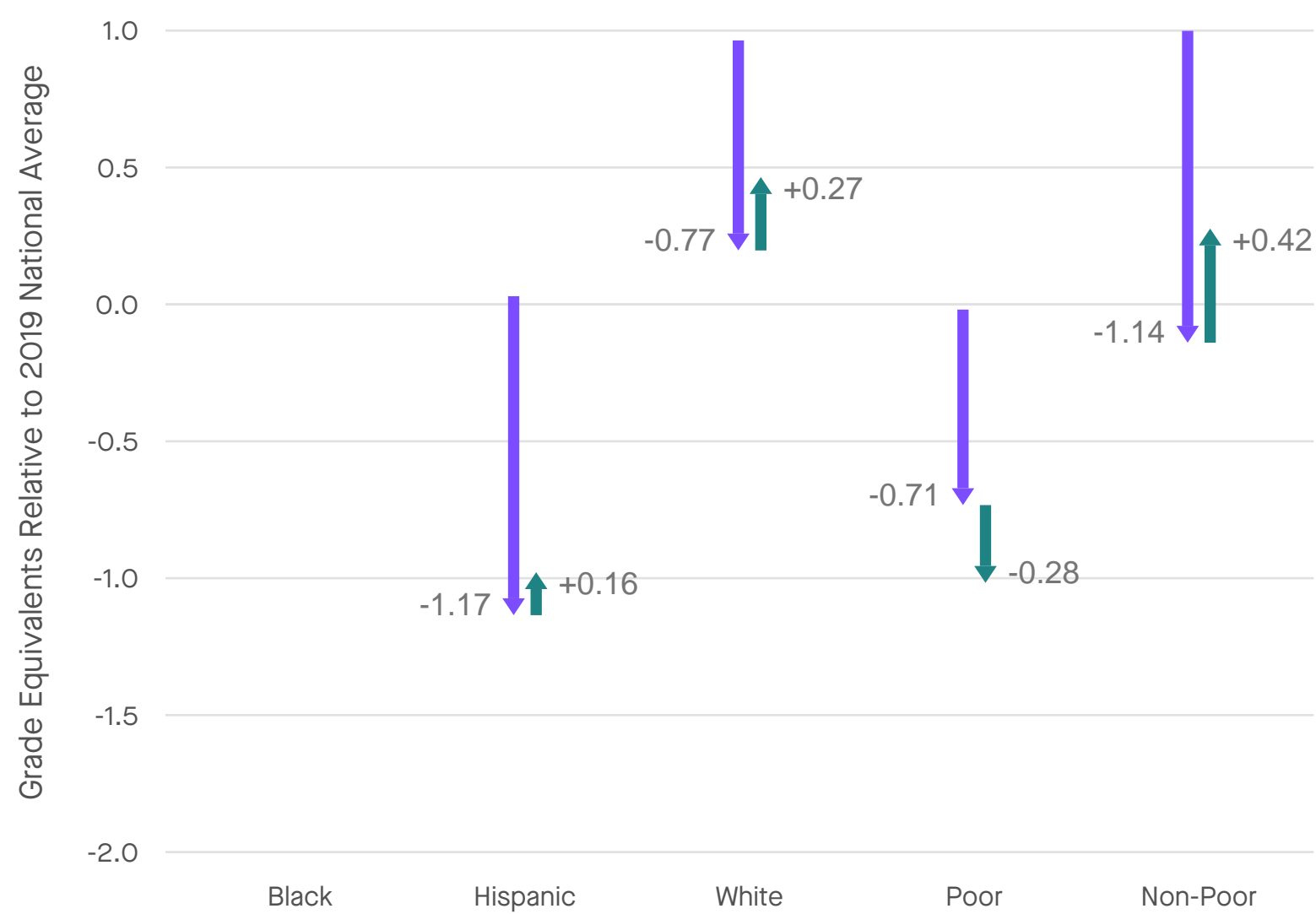

Math Performance by Subgroup, Grades 3-8, 2019-2023

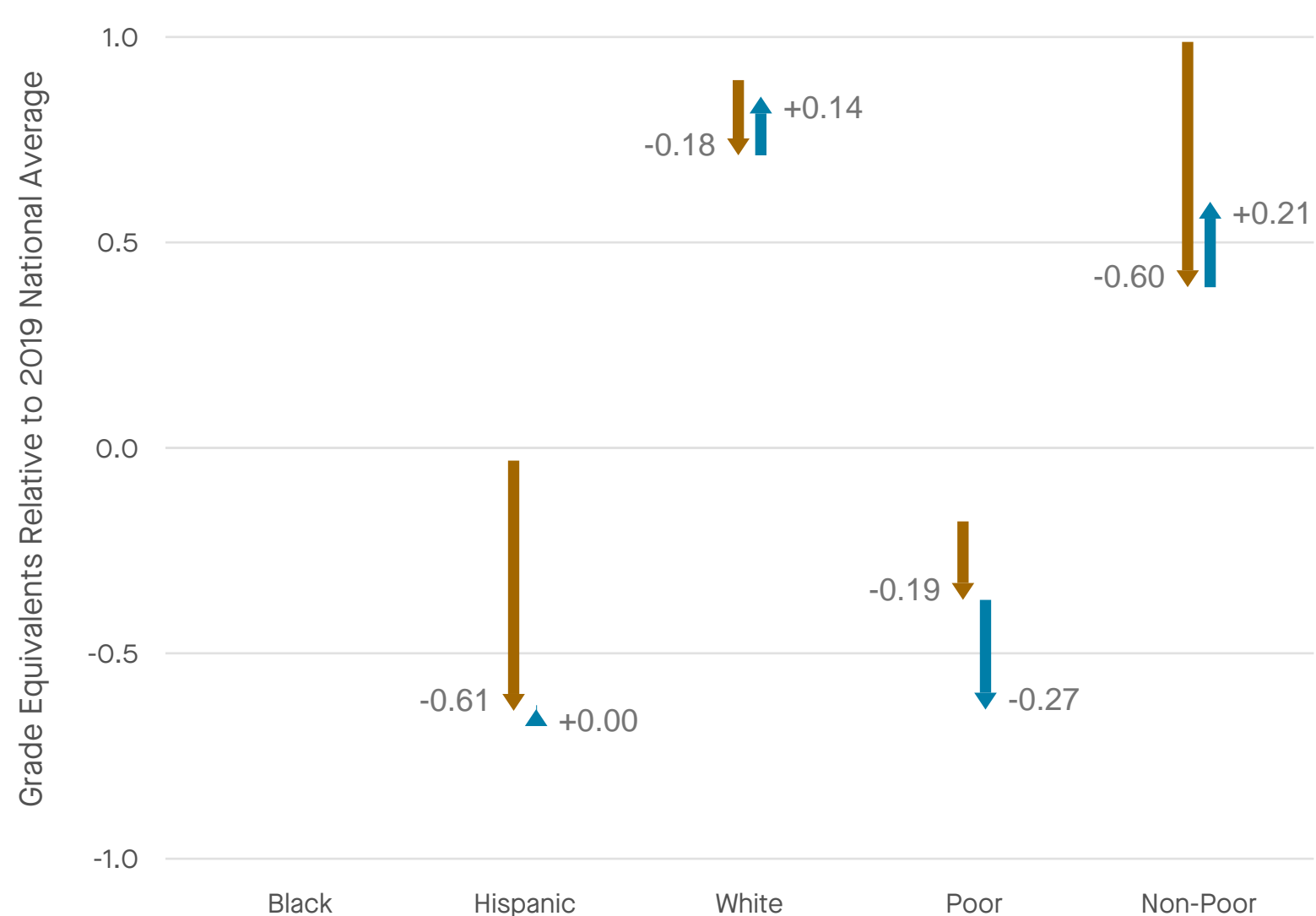

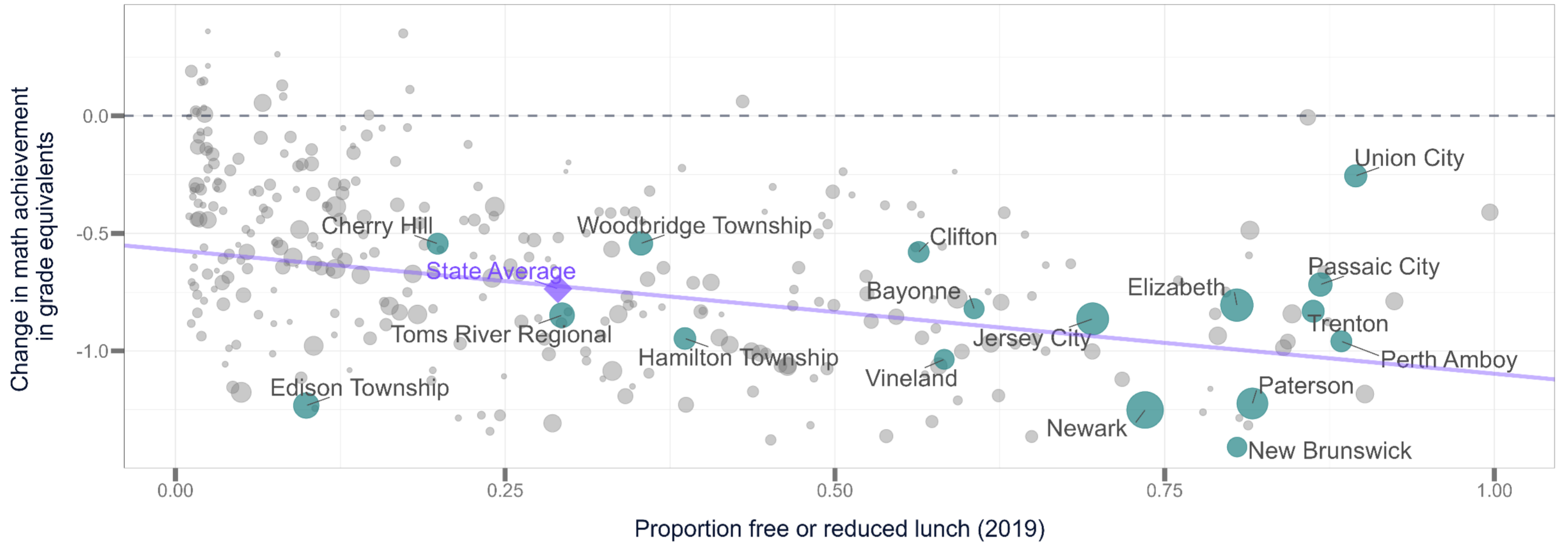

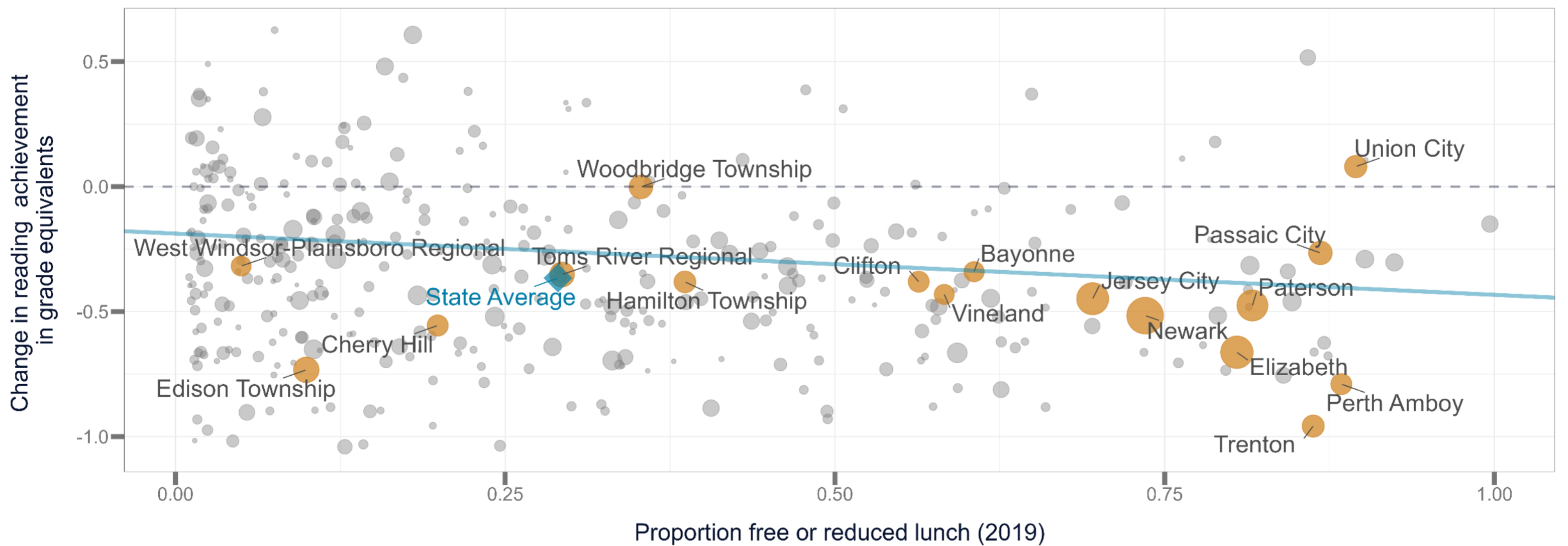
Change in Math Achievement 2019-2022 by proportion FRPL in New Jersey districts

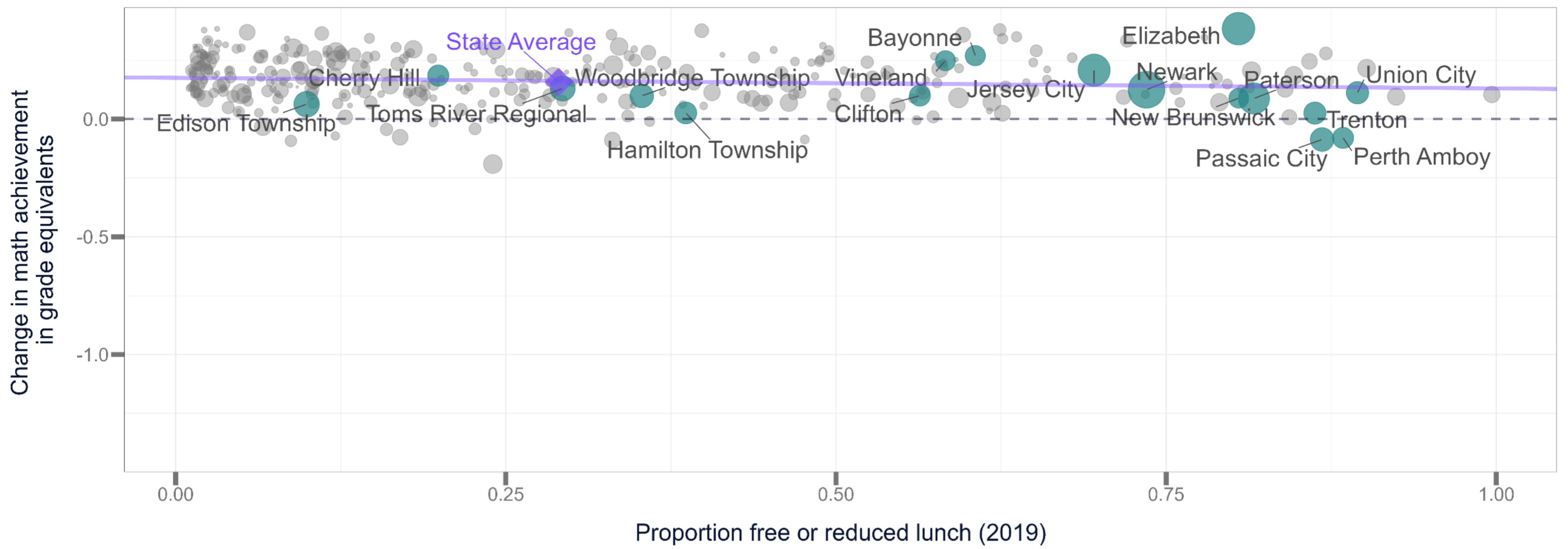
Change in Reading Achievement 2019-2022 by proportion FRPL in New Jersey districts

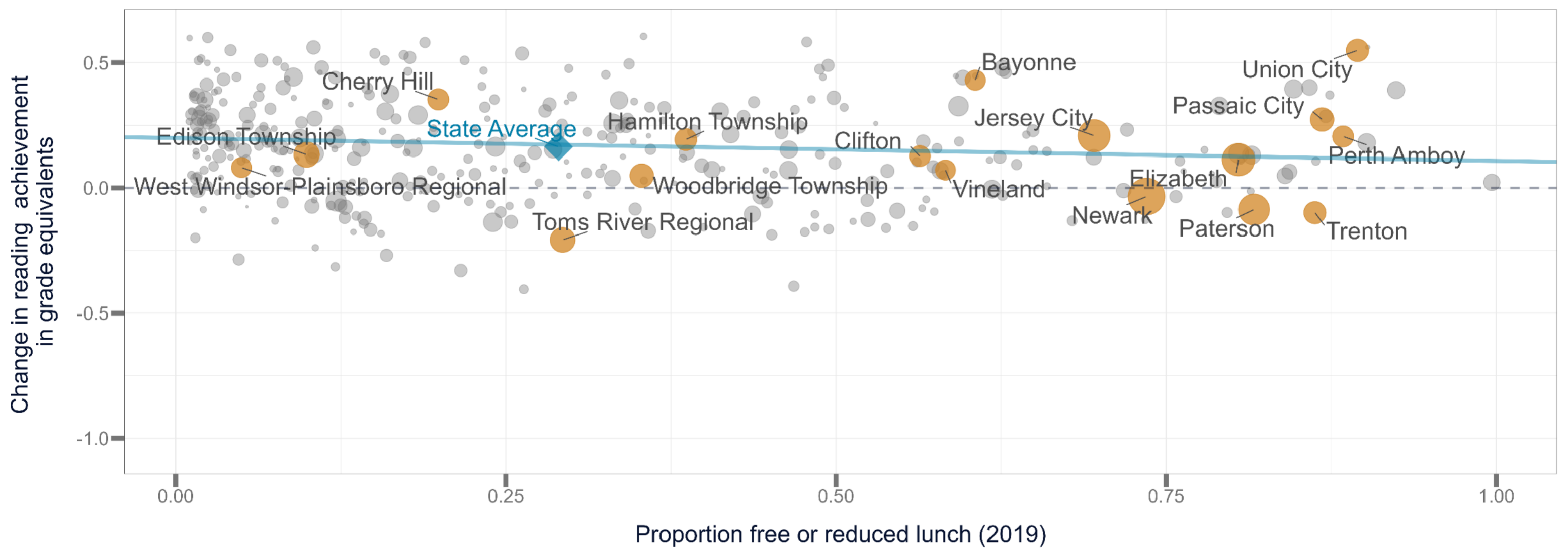

Change in Math Achievement 2022-2023 by proportion FRPL in New Jersey districts



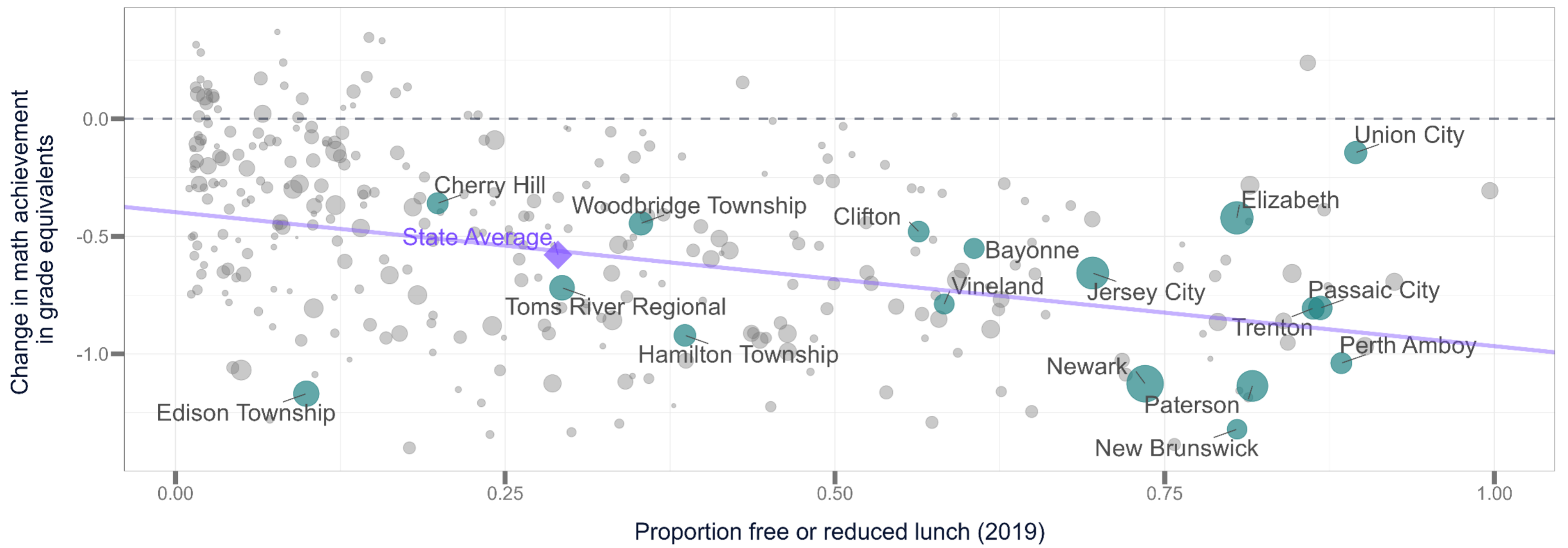

Change in Reading Achievement 2022-2023 by proportion FRPL in New Jersey districts



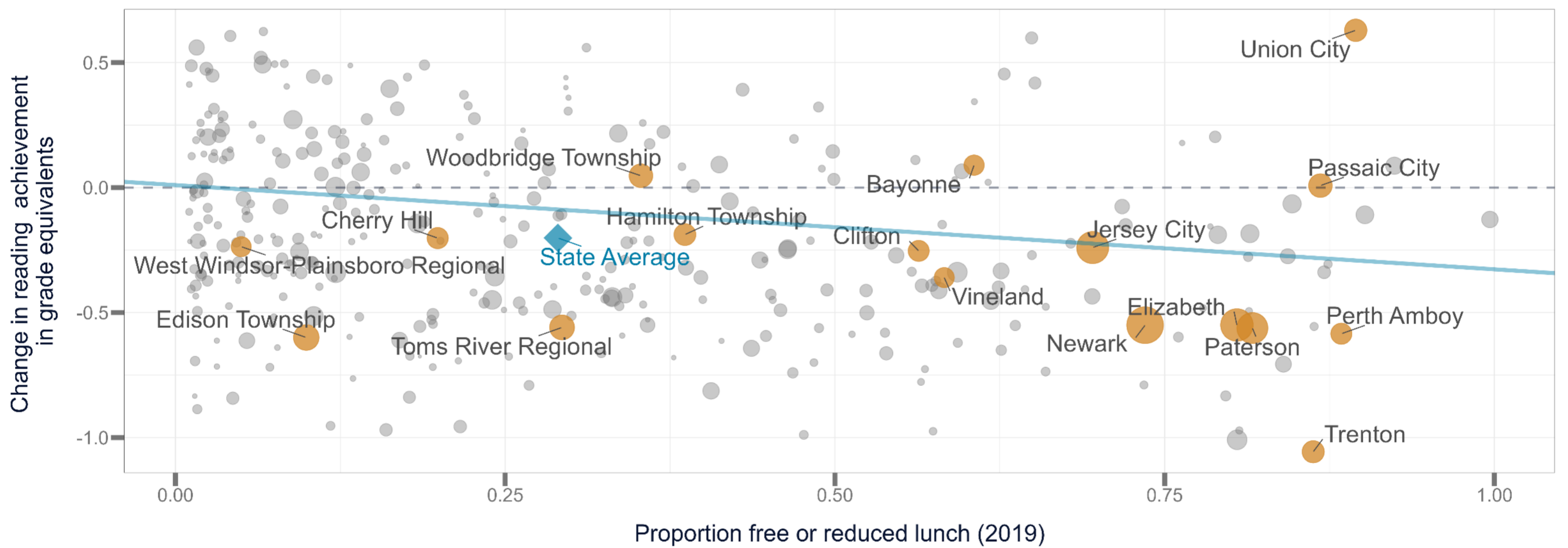

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Change in Reading Achievement 2019-2023 by proportion FRPL in New Jersey districts



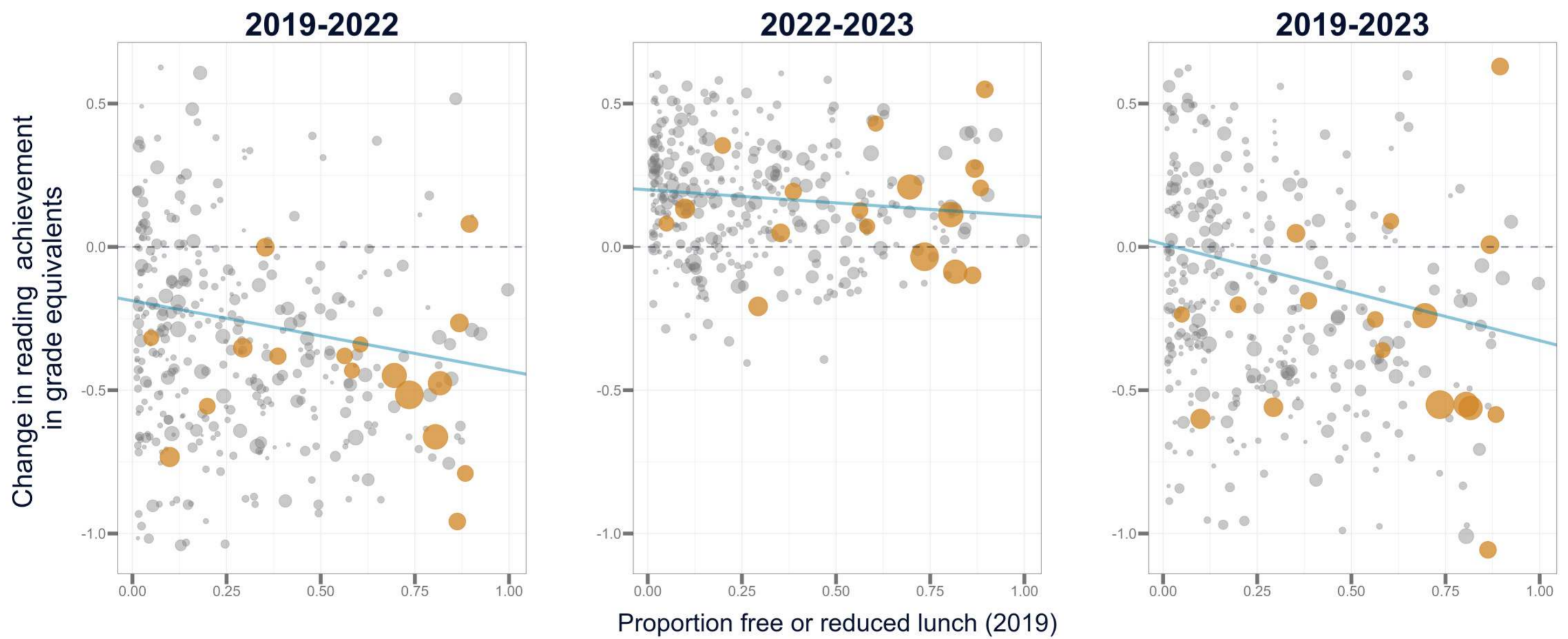

Change in Math Achievement by proportion FRPL in New Jersey districts



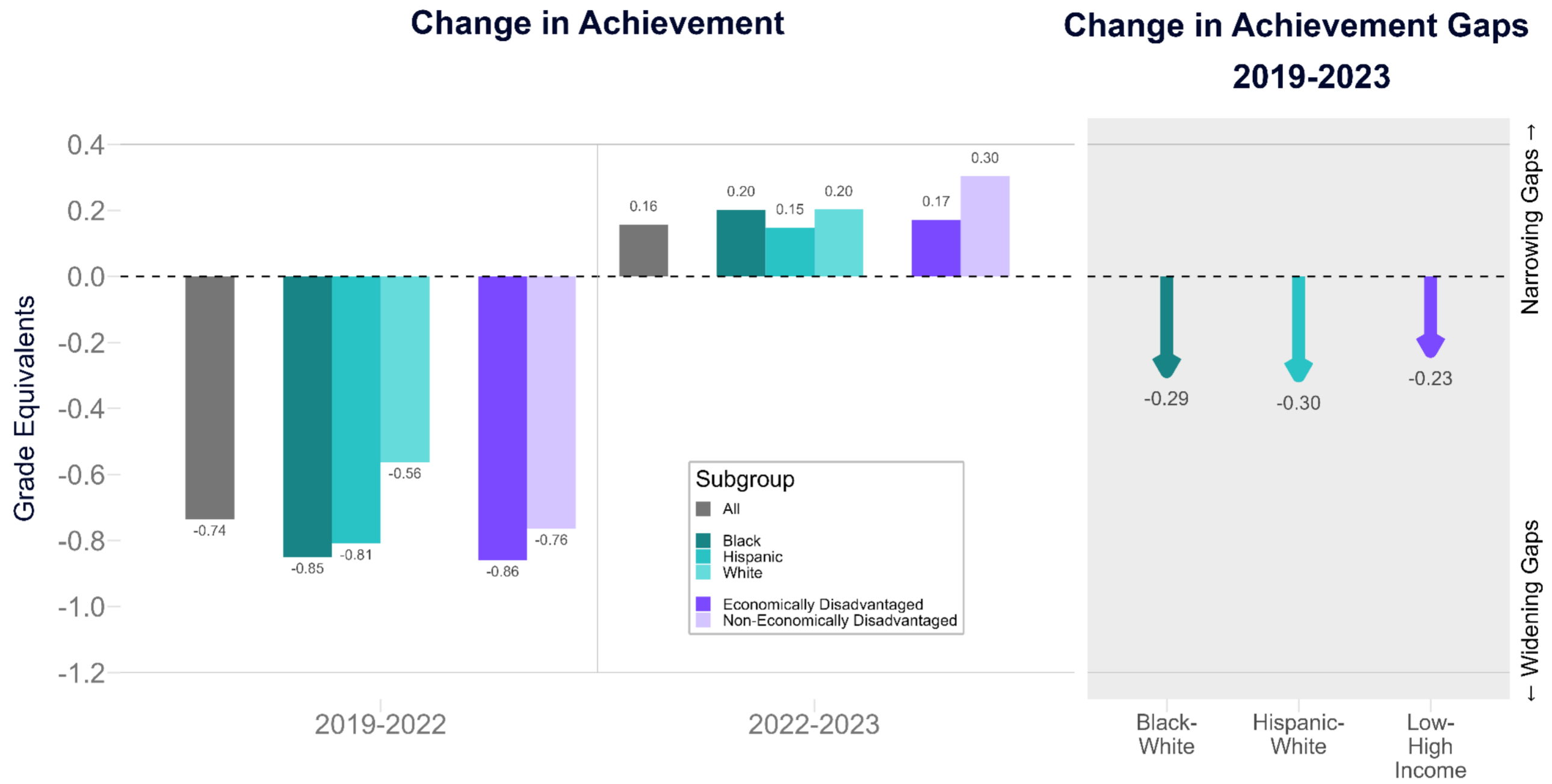

Change in Reading Achievement by proportion FRPL in New Jersey districts



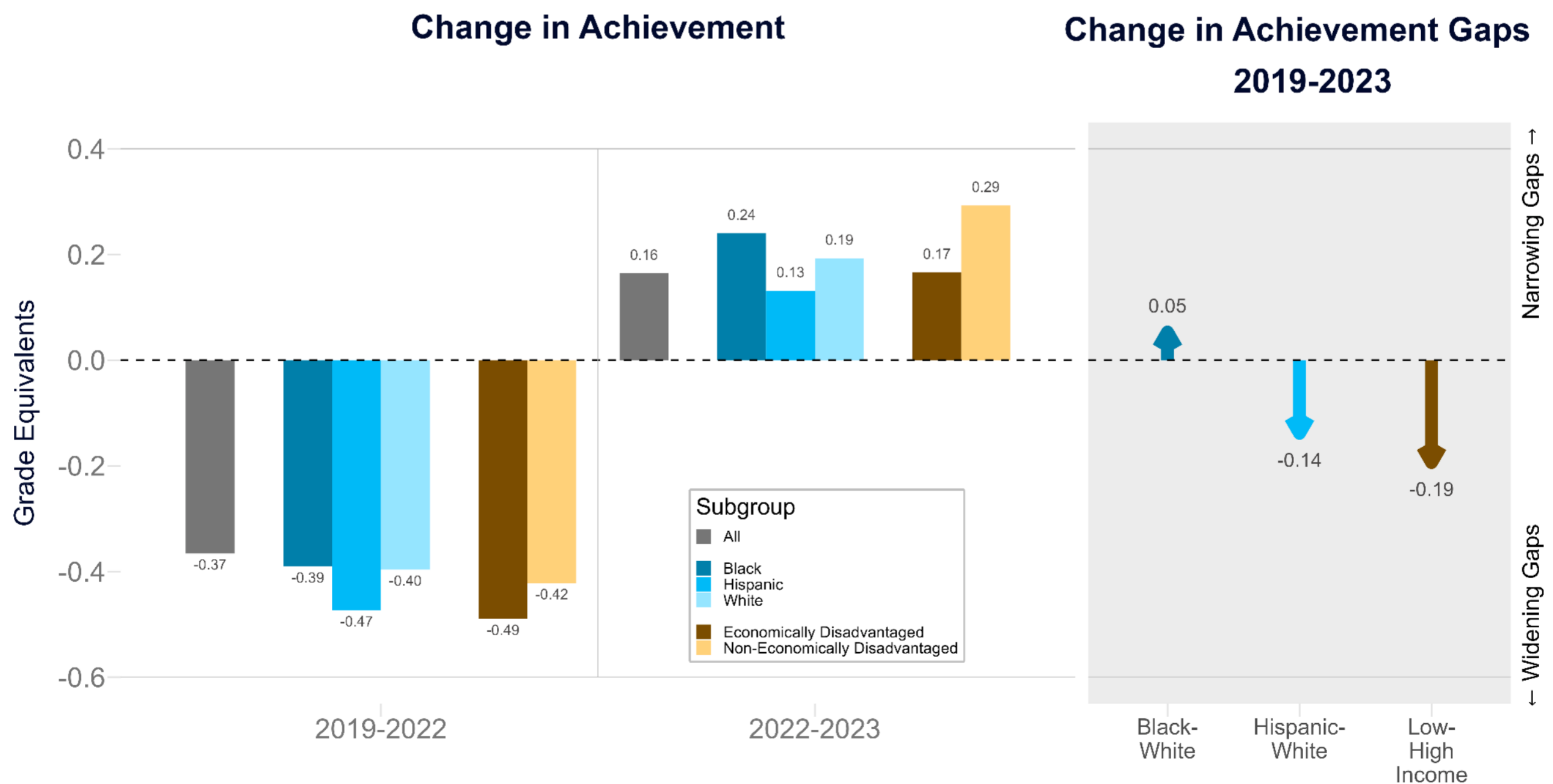
