













## Change in Math Achievement 2022-2023 by proportion FRPL in South Dakota districts







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## Change in Math Achievement 2019-2023 by proportion FRPL in South Dakota districts









by proportion FRPL in South Dakota districts





# Change in Reading Achievement by proportion FRPL in South Dakota districts




